Welcoming the Festive Season in Lakenheath

As the first winter chill settles in, our Remembrance Sunday event took place. and many of us gathered at our War Memorial to lay wreaths and remember those who died for our sakes from our community in years past. We prayed for world peace, which sadly seems more scarce than in years past. It also reminds us of the importance of community. The festive season is almost upon us, a time to celebrate, connect, and reflect on the year. As always, local groups are working to create a meaningful Christmas time for everyone. Whether joining others for the annual tree lighting or carolling by candlelight, there are many ways to embrace the spirit of togetherness and support our wonderful village. The complexity of budgets may seem distant, but they have a direct

that it is made up of our hard-earned Council Tax and a complex array of grant funding for this and that. Simply put, there is not enough money to fund all the services we would want to invest in, from Child protection services to repairing our roads. Nowadays, 75% of the budget goes on Adult and Child services, which leaves far less than we would want to spend on our highways and other community projects. It is always a complex set of decisions that must be considered and decided on over the next two months ahead of the February Budget meeting.

The removal of the Winter Fuel Allowance is appalling, and that, coupled with the rising cost of electricity and heating oil, will mean a difficult winter ahead for many. If you are going to struggle, reach out to the Parish Council and councillors such as myself, and we will help direct you to funds that can help you heat your home this coming winter. Our food bank, community cafes, and warm spaces are available to anyone in need of a little extra support. This winter, more than ever, we need to extend the spirit of giving to all in our community.

So please get involved, whether through volunteering, joining a festive event, or simply checking in with a neighbour. Let's come together to celebrate all that makes Lakenheath, Sedge Fen and Undley special and ensure that no one feels left out during Christmas.

That leaves me to wish you a very Merry Christmas, and here's to a happy and healthy New Year.

A Message from Lakenheath Parish Council Chair **Gerald Kelly**

Christmas is coming and the village decorations will be appearing soon! It is a special and enjoyable time of year for most of us, but not for all...

As we know the Winter Fuel Payment has stopped for all except those receiving benefits: the concern is that so many aren't claiming benefits and could face real problems. There are lots of reasons (whether real or imagined) people have for not claiming benefits, from not being able to fill in the forms to thinking that it is a form of charity. Lakenheath has a history of looking after its own, and this is a time when we should all be making sure our neighbours don't go without unnecessarily. Citizens Advice and Suffolk Councils at all levels have some arrangements in place to help, but need to know where that help is needed, so I would ask you all to think about our older neighbours who might be at risk. If there is someone you know who could be facing hardship and you can have a comfortable conversation with them, get them to talk to Citizens Advice: the number is in the front of this magazine. If you have concerns but don't think you can have that conversation. please do let one of your Councillors or the Parish Office know and they can take it from there. It could be the best Christmas present you could give!

In the meantime there's lot's going on, with road closures and diversions what feels like every other day and largely there's not much we can do apart from asking those responsible to keep things to a minimum. However my second appeal is around what we can do! Our road the B1112 - is now officially the worst B road, and the worst 'per mile' in Suffolk for speeding. That is pretty dreadful and while we will be pressing farmers, hauliers and the Base to talk to their staff, it is not all "those others". With the extra traffic generated by the new housing we must all - basically - do better!

Although these things are important, I think it is equally important to make the best of what we have. So I'll finish Geralo by wishing you all a peaceful Christmas, and a happy and prosperous 2025!

Winter Gardening 2024

The final month of the year is here, but there's still plenty to do in the garden! Sure, the demand for watering and dead-heading has stopped but the garden doesn't have to be out of bounds during the winter. A few hours spent in the garden quickly gives visual results and caring for plants will lift your mood. If you can't get outside go on pintrest or flick through gardening books and magazines for inspiration! Here are the key gardening jobs for Winter:

December:

From late November until late February its Bare Root Season. Bare Roots are plants, usually trees, hedging, soft fruits, roses, and even some perennials, that have been grown in the ground then lifted for sale when dormant. They are sold without any soil or pots which makes them much cheaper to transport. They are usually sold mail order, but some large nurseries will also offer a great selection of bare root plants. It is essential that the roots of a bare-root plant don't dry out. Be sure to soak the roots in winter as soon as you receive your plants. If you can't plant immediately - if the soil is frozen, for example - heel them in until the weather improves. Sprinkling mycorrhizal fungi around the roots when planting will increase nutrient and water uptake and help bare-root plants establish well. Bare Root roses can be susceptible to damage from cold, drying winds so if the weather is particularly bad it may be worth potting them and keeping them in a very sheltered location before planting when conditions are better.

Other tasks for December:

- Winter prune plants that are prone to bleeding such as grapevines, birch, walnuts and Acers (Japanese Maples).
- Keep off lawns in frosty or snowy conditions, however, if The winter is mild

- then keep removing fallen leaves from lawns to let in light and prevent dead patches.
- Take care not to let leaves accumulate around Alpines, they will die if left damp

January:

The new gardening season begins. January is a month of promises to come. You can start sowing hardy seeds, chitting seed potatoes and add colour by planting snowdrops, primulas, winter flowering shrubs and hellebores.

Other tasks for January:

- Cut back old foliage of ornamental grasses and perennials such as sedums.
- Winter Prune Wisteria
- Remove yellowing leaves from your winter brassicas as they are no use to the plant and may harbour pests and diseases.
- Finish pruning apple trees and pear trees.
- Start forcing Rhubarb by placing an old bucket over the crown.
- Plant new soft fruit bushes and canes (as long as the ground is not frozen).

February:

It's time to put the pruners into action! It's time to finish tidying the borders, cutting back old growth of perennials and grasses. You can also cut back over-wintered fuchsias and pelargoniums to encourage new growth. Trim deciduous hedges before birds start nesting, and prune back any winter flowering shrubs that have finished flowering such as Mahonia, Viburnum and Heathers. And whilst the pruners are in your hands don't forget to prune back the colourful stems of dogwoods and salix, you can prune right to their base to encourage lots of fresh new growth that will give bright stems next winter!

We are continuing to see more people seeking our help with their issues and problems. Between April and the end of August this year, we have helped 3,137 clients with 12,172 issues. For the same five months in 2023, we helped 2,714 clients with 10,932 issues.

Pension Credit is very much in the news right now, due to the recent changes to the qualifying conditions for the Winter Fuel Payment. Below is a link to the 'Winter Fuel Payment' on the GOV.UK website.

We can support people of pensionable age to check if they are eligible and make a claim for Pension Credit.

We made a successful grant funding application to the Nationwide's Community Grants Fund, last year as we wanted to do more to support older people. We were aware that Pension Credit was significantly underclaimed by older people and this was one of the reasons for the application.

Supporting Each Other: Focus on Winter

You may have heard Winter Fuel Payments being discussed in the news recently. They used to be paid to everyone over State Pension age, regardless of their income. This has now changed. Only people who get Pension Credit will receive the one off Winter Fuel Payment this year.

And it's not just help with heating costs - getting Pension Credit opens the door to additional benefits such as help with the cost of dental work, glasses and transport to hospital; help with rent or mortgage interest; and help paying Council Tax. Not to mention a free TV Licence for those aged 75 and over.

A lot of people think if they have savings they won't be entitled, but that is not always the case. While 1.4 million households in the UK already receive Pension Credit, an estimated 880,000 people are eligible for it, but not receiving it.

Can you help us reach these people? If you have friends or family over State Pension age (currently 66), ask them if they have checked their eligibility. They can find out more here: www.gov.uk/ pension-credit, or by calling 0800 99 1234. Applications can be made online or over the phone.

You don't need to be an expert on **Pension Credit:**

Just encourage people to check their eligibility themselves, or support them to do so, either over the phone 0800 99 1234 or online: www.gov.uk/pension-credit

The guickest way to apply for Pension Credit is to call the claim line 0800 99 1234 (a friend or family member can call for them as long as they are with the person at the time) or go online www. gov.uk/pension-credit

What about people who are not entitled to Pension Credit?

Below you will find details of support throughout West Suffolk available to our communities who may find themselves vulnerable this winter.



The Government Funded Household Support Fund has been extended until March 2025 and is an allocation of funding given to Suffolk County Council to support people who are experiencing hardship or struggling with the rising costs. Suffolk County Council allocates Household Support Fund money to residents in a number of ways including Local Welfare Assistance Scheme (details below). A fund set up for those experiencing financial hardship and can help with food, heating, clothing, fuel and white goods. Full details and eligibility criteria can be found on the website. This fund is changing so it is important you keep up to date by visiting the website.

Applications are made online, or with support from a partner organisation such as Citizens Advice. Warm Homes Suffolk: Warm Homes Suffolk

Grants available to help insulate and make properties more energy efficient. Eligibility can be checked online or by contacting 03456 037 686. This fund is available to homeowners, renters and landlords and is provided throughout the county.

Check entitlement to other benefits such as Housing Benefit, Support for Mortgage Interest, Council Tax Reduction. Attendance Allowance, Carers Allowance and more. These could increase your income and help you better afford your bills. Use an online benefits calculator or contact an advice agency such as Age UK or Citizens Advice.

There are two different types of discretionary payment funds available: Discretionary Housing Payment: for those in receipt of Housing Benefit or Housing Element of Universal Credit and Exceptional Hardship Payments: for those receiving council tax reduction.

Both payments are short term and one off but are aimed at helping those experiencing exception financial hardship. Individuals can apply on line and full details of funding available can be found by visiting the website (application form is through this website as well)

Help with the cost of heating oil:

"Suffolk Oil Loans" from Eastern Savings & Loans, a Credit Union. They offer an interest-free loan of up to £500 for heating oil. This is only available to residents of Suffolk. You need to become a member of Eastern Savings & Loans to apply. Membership costs £5

LAKENHEATH PARISH WALKS

akenheath is fortunate to have a good network of footpaths and the Parish Walk normally explores these every other Sunday afternoon, helping you to enjoy the beautiful area in which we live as well as keeping the footpaths open. FOOTPATH NEWS

I am not sure about the state of the footpaths as I have not been well enough to go on a walk. All the paths should have been cut in August and the next cut is due in May. So, if you go walking and find a footpath is overgrown or impassible, it is important that you report it to Suffolk County Council. Hopefully then the County Council will take action to get it cut or take whatever remedial action is required.

To report a footpath problem to the County Council, go on their website and select Roads and Transport, then public rights of way in Suffolk, then report a public right of way issue. You will then be able to open up a map and pinpoint the location and, on the left hand side, select the type of problem and give details.

If you prefer to telephone you can ring James Pickerin, the County Footpath Officer for this area, on 01284 741352 and leave a message if he is out.

If we want the footpaths to be kept open, it is essential that problems are reported to the County Council.

Edited extracts from the village Timeline 5, 1914-1920. lakenheath.onesuffolk.net/lakenheath-heritage

In the late 19th century until about 1912 Sir William Dunn MP and Lady Dunn lived at 'The Retreat,' formerly North Lawn Cottage. The house was set in large arounds at was then the northwestern end of the village. Hall Drive was one of the entrances leading to The Retreat which they had greatly enlarged. Sir William died in 1912 and the estate was later sold. In the 1930's the house was renamed Lakenheath Hall by Sir Charlton and Lady Grace Briscoe and it now forms part of the Lakenheath Park Estate. Christmas 1914 was probably the last Christmas when the 'gentle folk' gave their employees a 'Christmas Box.'

Christmas 1914. Following tradition, villagers received annual gifts from the local landowners. Lady Dunn, by now a widow, gave tea (probably the ingredients for the drink not a meal) to the widows of the village. The employees of The Retreat Estate, of Lord Iveagh of Elveden Hall and of Mr. Newdick of Undley Lodge received their usual gift of beef.

Lord Iveagh also gave a Christmas tree to St. Mary's Church and a bag of sweets and an orange to each 'scholar.' The choir of the Baptist Church went carol singing and the LakenheathTemperance Band went out on Boxing Day and 'enlivened the holiday.'

- 1914. January. The Football team played Northwold with ten men in the first half and lost 2-1. At least three of the team died in the coming war. The team was, G Garden,? Bailey, G Hall, B Flack, W Harvey, Geo. Badcock, A Coleman, A Rutterford, S Cooper, S Coleman. H Rutterford.
- 1914. March. 'There had been some improvement in the disposal of house refuse but many houses were in poor condition. Some cases of tuberculosis had been treated but those with no insurance had no chance of treatment.' Bury Free Press. Sat. March 21st 1914.
- 1914. June. Following the death of Sir William Dunn 'The Retreat' was sold to Councillor Robert Bilsland tenant of Churchgate Farm on the High Street.
- 1914. WW1 was declared on 28th July. Lakenheath warren east of the A1065 was used as a bombing range by planes from Feltwell and Thetford. The army also used the area for artillery practice. It has been suggested that early tanks were tested on the eastern part of the warren. A narrow-gauge railway was made to carry building materials for the building of Feltwell aerodrome. In the summer hundreds of troops marched through the village and were given gifts of fruit and tea by the villagers.

- 1915. In January a good view of the flooded Lakenheath Fen could be seen from Maids Cross Hill. The Fen flooded regularly until the Lakenheath Flood Relief Scheme was completed in 1963.
- 1915. A roll of honour of the names of Lakenheath Scouts who had 'joined up' was on display in the Post Office.
- 1917. At the end of July possibly the largest public event ever to take place in the village saw the unveiling of the Kitchener Memorial in St. Mary's Church. Lord Kitchener was Secretary of State for War until his death by drowning in 1916 when HMS Hampshire hit a mine. His ancestors lived in the village in the 17th century in the recently demolished 'Kitchener Cottage' formerly known as 'Rookery Farm'. Lord Derby, Secretary of State for War was to unveil the tablet but 'unfortunately he was called to a conference in Paris'! After the service, which was attended by several national figures and the Lord Lieutenant of the County, a reception and luncheon were held in the grounds of The Retreat hosted by Mr. Bilsland. Large crowds were said to have attended the occasion. Bury Free Press Sat. August 4th 1917.
- 1917. A Zepplin airship dropped bombs on the Turf Pits drove just west of the village not far from Undley.
- 1917. The Russian Revolution.
- 1918. Serious food shortages led to food rationing- imprisonment was a penalty for the infringement of rationing regulations. There was a proposal that The Retreat should be used as an agricultural training centre for men suffering from shell-shock and the after effects of tuberculosis. A Mr. W Salmon became the owner of The Retreat and a few years later he gave the village the land on which the Peace Memorial Hall (Village Hall) is built.
- 1918. The war ended on 11th November. When the armistice was announced flags rapidly appeared on the church tower and in the High Street. Children had the day off school and took part in a parade with addresses being given in the High Street by the Headmaster, W H Gilbey, Rev W S Cooper, and Rev J G M Stretton. In the evening St Mary's Church bells pealed loudly and a united thanksgiving service was arranged.
- 1919. The RAF left the warren in the spring. By early summer discussions were well advanced about the siting of a War Memorial. The RAF did not return until 1940.
- 1919. In December a hurricane-type storm struck the village, on Station Road a car was blown into a ditch. It caused havoc at Rookery Farm.
- 1919. The football club reformed after the war. Originally known as Lakenheath Rovers in 1907, it was now Lakenheath Wanderers. Mr. S Penson offered his field (possibly in Broom Road) for the new season.
- 1919. There were local political disagreements over the siting of the War Memorial which were eventually resolved and the Unveiling and Dedication took place in March 1921. The building of a Village Hall was agreed and a committee established. The hall opened on November 11th, Remembrance Day, 1922. It had taken six months to build.
- 1920. The Parish Council approved the building of a cinema in the village and 'moving pictures' were on the way.

How to Become an Author by Lorraine Gregory

READ!

Read a lot, as much as you can, read books you love and even some you hate. Most of what I needed to know about writing came from all the reading I'd been doing all my life.

Start reading critically, think about what you like and don't like. Notice the way authors control the action and bring their characters to life. Think about what you would change or do differently. Explore different genres and styles, find what speaks to you the most.

For me it was fantasy and sci fi that I really loved because I so enjoyed creating new worlds and writing for children appealed to me because I knew the effect an amazing book could have on a child and I wanted to be a part of that.

WRITE!

First of all just write something short, something you are excited about. The most important thing is to finish it, even if you think it's terrible. You can't fix something if you never finish it. No author writes a book that's perfect first time round. Every single book you've ever seen in a bookshop has been re written and edited ten, twenty, fifty times!

So practice, practice, practice, Sometimes it will feel amazing and you'll enjoy every minute though sometimes it will feel awful and impossible and vou'll have to struggle through.

I've been writing for over ten years now and it doesn't get much easier I'm afraid. Each book goes through the same stages of ves. this is great, to no, this is terrible, to actually it's not bad, to HELP I CAN'T DO THIS, to I think it might be done, to oh no. I need to rewrite it all AGAIN!

Despite all that. I love what I do and still think writing a book is a little bit like magic.

SHARE!

This is one of the hardest things to do. I found it really scary to let other people read my work and it took me a loooong time. If you don't have a friend you trust or a helpful reader around then the best thing to do is look for a writing/critique group. Some of these are online which can make it more convenient and some might meet in person which can help build up a supportive friend group.

Don't ask for critique too early in the process though because you might find it overwhelming. When you've done as much work on it as you can and you feel like you're just not sure what else needs to be done that's the time to ask for help. You'll be amazed how helpful it can be and at the same time reading other people's work can be hugely educational and help hone your critique skills!

If you want to become a published author then you have to accept that you will probably fail many, many times. The life of an author is full of rejection, at the start when you're trying to get an agent and then a publisher you will no doubt receive many rejections AND even after you are published you will probably face many more rejections. The only thing you can do is accept that is normal, keep going, get better, don't give up and HOPE that eventually you find someone who loves your work as much as you do.

NEW NEST BOX PROJECT AT LAKENHEATH CEMETERY

On a brisk Saturday morning in October, I installed ten new nest boxes in Lakenheath Cemetery, marking the start of an exciting local bird monitoring project. With support from the Lakenheath Parish Council, this initiative aims to provide nesting locations for some of our most common British birds while gathering valuable data on their breeding success.

The standard hole boxes that you'll see on the trees are designed for species such as Blue Tits, Great Tits, and Coal Tits, and are now awaiting their first residents. As spring approaches, it's hoped that we'll also see Robins or Wrens taking up residence in the open-fronted boxes, which are strategically placed among denser foliage and therefore more concealed than the standard boxes.

Once the breeding season begins in March or April, the nest boxes will be monitored weekly, tracking the stages

from nest building to fledging. Crucially, the data collected will contribute to the British Trust for Ornithology's (BTO) Nest Record Scheme, a national effort that has monitored nesting birds since 1939. Under licensed supervision, chicks will be ringed once they reach a suitable size, helping researchers to follow their movements and even identify returning adults in future years.

News from RSPB Lakenheath Fen

As we head into winter. the wildlife on the reserve has changed

quite dramatically. Many weeks ago we saw our last Swallows, Cuckoos and Nightingales, and on 11 October we had our last record of a Hobby on site. These elegant birds of prev are about the size of a Kestrel but look a bit like a small Peregrine, with a dark slate-grey back, a dark-spotted off-white chest, and in adults, a red patch of feathers around the base of the legs. They cut through the air a bit like House Martins or Swallows as they hunt for large insects like dragonflies and chafers, so they tend to stick around into Autumn until the insect numbers start to drop. We are still seeing the occasional butterfly, usually a Peacock or a Large white, plus, if the sun comes out we still spy a few of the beautiful and delicate Willow emerald damselflies or the red Common darter dragonflies.

In place of the Hobbies hundreds of Whooper Swans have arrived, which roost on the Hockwold Washes at night. These have flown down from Iceland. mostly, though a small number breed in northern Scotland. They are attracted to our milder conditions in the UK and also the glut of food in ourlocal fields following the harvest. They will enjoy picking through the stubble, spilt seed or sugar beet tops. For roostingat night, they like a shallow, broad body of water where they feel safer than on land from predators like foxes. If there's a clear sky and a full moon, they may stay out feeding all night and may not come into roost at dusk. If you would like to come and see them, then take a seat at the Washland Viewpoint, on the riverbank, near the Visitor Centre at dawn or dusk and you should see them arrive or leave. You may also see other twilight wildlife like Barn owls, Woodcock or bats, too.



As well as the Whooper swans, Autumn has brought in hundreds of Redwings, a small thrush with chocolate-brown wings and a rusty-red patch on the sides of their bodies. At the time of writing (7 November) we don't yet have any of their larger cousins the Fieldfares, who tend to arrive later. Redwings often gather in the bare poplar trees along the entrance track, especially in the early mornings or early evenings, often in their hundreds. They then take flight and stream over the Visitor Centre, making their high-pitched calls, as they go in search of berry bushes or fields full of worms to feast on. Many small birds such as Goldcrests, Pied Wagtails and Blackbirds arrive in the UK when the weather turns colder and boost numbers of their own species. One special visitor to look out for is an all-black male Blackbird. you may even see one in your garden if you feed the birds. First-year males (that hatched in the summer of 2024) on the Continent have a black bill for their first winter, not the usual yellow one. So if you see one in your garden or street, you know he is a long-distance traveller! It's not just the bird scene that has changed in recent weeks we have seen an increase in sightings of certain mammals

too. We have the very popular Otter here all year but in wetter weather they are quite enthusiastic about fishing, perhaps because of the effect the rain has on the fish, drawing them to the surface and in colder weather they need to eat more. Whilst we receive about 80% of our human visitors for the year during the Spring, it is always Autumn and Winter when these fewer visitors spot more Otters, so they must be quite a bit more common in the colder months. Sightings have recently come from Mere Hide, or Gary's Pool. If you come looking for them, it's important to be patient and to keep an eye out for ripples in the water, they are quite shy and unless you see a family group, usually silent but the ripples can betray their elegant swimming below the surface. Follow the bubbles and you just might see one emerge onto a bank or reed heap and spend some time in view above the water! We should also soon be spotting more Roe deer, who like to patrol the entrance track in a small group during the winter. We don't

see them much in the Summer but they do return to us when it gets colder.

Aside from the wildlife, the humans that work and volunteer on the reserve have been busy making changes and improvements to what we can offer visitors. A few months ago, our new warden Henry (who replaced Emma) began working here after moving from RSPB Fen Drayton near Cambridge. He has proved a real asset to the team and his hard-working nature and commitment are obvious to us. He was thrown in at the deep end a little bit with the mammoth task of designing and organising the build of our new raised dipping pond. The reason for the urgency was that a local partnership scheme, BFER (Brecks, Fen Edge and Rivers trust) was coming to a close and had some 'underspend' money from the National Lottery. Our Site Manager Dave quickly put in a proposal to build us a new raised dipping pond, and thanks to the generosity of BFER, it was approved. The only catch was we had to have most of it built and



the money spent by the end of September. This was early August! Nevertheless, Henry did a super job of drawing up plans, organising contractors for the necessary groundworks and foundations, and getting the pond built. We also owe a huge debt to our volunteer team, as without them we would never have got the work done on time or to the standard that has been achieved. Many of our volunteers have worked in construction and engineering jobs before retirement, so their decades of experience come in so useful and they so generously offer their time and effort in return for a few modest tea breaks. Well, so long as the biscuits are good! Included in this article is a photograph of the pond as it looks now, on 7 November, it just needs planting up with native aquatic Fenland plants from elsewhere on the reserve. We will also construct a ramp to allow smaller children or wheelchair users to access one end at the optimum height.

Other developments include continuing work on Cowles Drove, making the fields there wetter and more suited to breeding waders like Redshank and Lapwing. We purchased 54 hectares of land down the drove in early 2023 and work has progressed through habitat and wildlife surveys. Assessments of the soil took place and we are now nearing the end of the phase of groundworks to adjust the water levels there. Ditches have been dug to encourage the flow of water from the river onto the new land, as well as bunds added to help the land hold more water when they do get wet. Raising the water table will make the fields more attractive to breeding waders, many of which are suffering huge declines in our countryside and need more suitable space to breed and find food. The breeding population of Redshank has declined by 49% in the UK between 1995 and 2022, and Lapwing by 62% between 1967 and 2022. It will be a few years before we can measure our success, but

2024 has been a year filled with work to try and make the new land suitable for them.

We are also making preparations for our 30th Anniversary celebrations next year. Quite unbelievably, 2025 will mark three decades since the first part of the reserve was bought by the RSPB. We are hoping to hold a Spring fayre with free entry and a range of activities on offer for all ages. We are making plans to offer pond dipping. bug hunting and to have a guided walk on offer, amongst other activities. We are also organising a special pin badge to commemorate our 30thAnniversary and hope too to have a display board of historical photographs for visitors to enjoy. following the history of the land here as far back as the early 1900's.

I hope this article has given you a good idea of what has been happening at your local RSPB reserve in the past few months. Through the winter, our Visitor Centre and toilets will be open from 9am to 4pm every day excluding 23 December to 1 January. The footpaths, viewpoints, Mere Hide and our car park will be open every day during daylight hours for you to enjoy. If you haven't been to see us before, entry is free for RSPB members or:

£4 per adult

£3 per student (please show valid ID)

£2 for Children

FREE for Under 5's, the first child in a family and currently any 16-24 year old also gets free entry as part of a two-year trial by the RSPB. Please bring ID for anyone in this category if you have it.

FINALLY, RECOGNITION!

At this time of the year we all look forward, 2025 is around the corner. But we also look back. Remembrance and the service that our veterans have given.

Who knew that living in our midst we have an RAF Hero, 93 vear old Patrick 'Pete' Peters.

Pete joined the RAF in 1949 and operated during the 'Cold War' in the 50's. He served an incredible 38 years.

At this point there was spy activity between the West and the USSR. Atomic weapons were being developed. I guess we've all seen Oppenheimer. The development of deliverable, by air, of atomic weapons continued at pace.

Working together, the USA and UK, atomic tests were actually carried out in the Pacific Islands owned by the USA. The Marshall Islands, named after British Navy Captain John Marshall 1748-1819.

The tests were carried out in the early 50's and bombs were dropped. But information was needed regarding the effect of these bombs.

How did we get that? We needed to send an aircraft to a high altitude and take air samples. And what can do that? The British Canberra.

Our own Lakenheath veteran Sgn Leader Peters flew these aircraft through the clouds above the islands.

The samples were returned to base and unloaded. The crew of the teams were not awarded medals as the operation was attributed to the American Forces.

Pete has been continuously campaigning for recognition for those who took part in this action. Not only flying crew, but those ground crew who unloaded the toxic material.

The Mirror Newspaper quickly picked up on the campaign and with the push of reporter Susie Boniface the publicity drew attention and activity.

The new government has pushed through fresh criteria which the King has signed off. On Thursday 7th November, the Veterans Minister, Al Carns, visited Lakenheath and delivered his gong. Pete wore this with pride for all his comrades and indeed, all the service men and women involved at the Lakenheath's Remembrance service on Sunday 10th November.

The role of wives and partners play supporting our Armed Forces is often overlooked and the medals are also worn in tribute to them.



NEWS FROM SAINT MARY'S CHURCH, LAKENHEATH

It is now over twenty six years ago since the Church of England had the bright idea of illuminating Church buildings with outside floodlights for a celebration of the Millennium year 2000. We at Lakenheath took up the challenge to raise the £6,204:00 estimated by Lark Electrical to install a suitable lighting arrangement for Lakenheath's most iconic building and through special events, well supported by yourselves the general public, the handsome sum of £3274:36 was raised, enough with the help of Church funds to inform Lark Electrical that the illumination work could begin.

At a Parochial Church Council meeting the guestion of running costs was raised. One thought was that continued money raising events might bring in a surplus to requirements to be invested. with interest to pay electricity running cost, with continued coffee mornings, sales, fetes, bazaars, It took some years to raise the £2.715:94 paid from general Church funds. During that time folk were invited to pay the running cost in celebration of a birthday, anniversary or whatever their choice.

In line with the (go green) requirements the old sodium lamps have been recently replaced with more efficient L.E.D. lamps, costing in excess of £2000:00, supported by our local Christian Aid Foundation Charity, that is able to help so many of our local organisations thanks to Mr Lionel, (deceased founder).

Although the new lamps are much more efficient, in the shorter days it costs at least three pounds for every evening to bathe your beautiful ancient Church building is in modern bright light.

That old school was built in the same period as our local, well built, Victorian primary school that has been responsible for the education of so many of Lakenheath's people, for over 140 years, Lakenheath's other iconic building.

The Charity of Mr Goward and Mr Evans, founders of Lakenheath school, continues in the education of the young of our village and beyond, plus valuable relief to those in need.

Saint Mary's extends the message of peace and goodwill to all in this season of Christmastide.
