Remembering VJ Day and Honouring Our Past

As we approach the summer months, we must pause and reflect on a deeply significant date in our nation's history: Victory over Japan Day, or VJ Day, which falls on 15 August.

For Lakenheath, this is not just a historical moment -it is a time to remember and honour the brave men from our village who served, fought, and, in many cases, gave their lives in the gruelling campaigns of the Far East during the Second World War.

Victory over Japan Day marks the official end of the Second World War. While VE Day is often more widely commemorated and will be again this year on 8th May, VJ Day holds deep significance for many families in our village whose loved ones served in the Far East campaigns. It is a poignant moment to honour not only victory but the incredible sacrifice made by so many.

Lakenheath, like many rural communities, gave much to the war effort. Several young men from our village left the guiet familiarity of village life to serve in distant lands they had never heard of, such as Burma. Malaya, Singapore, and beyond. Some never returned: their names. etched in memorials and remembered in the hearts of families, remind us that peace was dearly bought. Others came back carrying the physical and

emotional scars of war, experiences rarely spoken of but deeply felt. Their courage and resilience deserve our lasting recognition.

That is why VJ Day remains such an important occasion for our community. It is a chance to give thanks for peace, to reflect on the cost of war, and to ensure that the sacrifices made by the men of Lakenheath are not forgotten. As a parish, we must continue to share their stories and preserve their legacy for future generations.

As with VE Day, it takes a number of organisations to put these events in place. Lakenheath Parish Council, Lakenheath Royal British Legion Committee, of which I am privileged to be a member, and Lakenheath Playing Fields Association. There will. of course, be a short ceremony and other events to be announced and together, we will, once more follow the UK Pageantmaster's timetable for the day across the nation.

All are welcome to attend. Whether you join us at a formal commemoration or mark the day in quiet reflection at home, your participation helps keep their memory alive.

Let us honour those who gave so much for our freedom and ensure that the names and bravery of Lakenheath's sons, with gratitude for those who gave their all, not in the spotlight of Europe but in the shadows of the Far East, continue to be remembered with pride.

You sometimes think it might slow down, but it never does!

Despite topless protesters at the base, walls falling down and more traffic lights through the village than you could shake a stick at, life goes on and we do have lots to look forward to! The first of these is that Nick Smith. who amongst a pile of other things saw through the replacement of our Post Office, is now Chairing the Parish Council. It has been a privilege for me to have that role and I think it's worth reminding everybody what a terrific team of unpaid Councillors we have working for the village. My personal thanks to them for their support and relentless efforts.

Our Active Lakenheath project lead has a separate piece in the magazine, so I'll leave most of that to Abi: what I must say is that cooperation and progress so far has been astonishing and everyone involved has worked hard and fast to make the most of this Sport England opportunity. Success will depend on getting everyone's views so please do let the team have vour views.

The other big project - our Neighbourhood Plan - has been stalled for some time but is now back and progressing. We need to get this done because of two important implications of Local Government Reform. The first is that with an inevitably more remote Unitary authority the Neighbourhood Plan will be a really important Planning tool. The second is that we will be moving to a system (the Community Infrastructure Levy (or CIL) where 25% of the increased contribution to infrastructure by builders and developers will be directly controlled by us. So really important, and as with Active Lakenheath, essential that you have your say!














All set up for The Annual Assembly in May! **Aka The Annual Parish Meeting**

£5.6 million lost to investment fraud in Suffolk in 2024

Suffolk residents and businesses lost £5.6million to investment fraud in 2024. with cryptocurrency fraud on the rise.

Data from Action Fraud reveals that people aged 35-44 were more likely to be targeted for investment fraud, while those aged 55-64 suffered the greatest financial losses.

Investment fraud occurs when criminals approach individuals, often out of the blue. and persuade them to invest in schemes or products that are either worthless or entirely fictitious. Fraudsters may claim to offer opportunities in foreign exchange, gold and other valuable metals, overseas time-shares, or cryptocurrency, promising unrealistically high returns that far exceed normal market trends.

In 2024, Action Fraud received 25,843 reports related to investment fraud, with victims collectively losing £649,062,146. While the number of reports represents a 7 per cent decrease compared to 2023, the total financial loss saw a 13 per cent increase highlighting that fewer but potentially larger scams were in operation. Cryptocurrency continued to be the most common asset fraudsters claimed to be investing in, accounting for 66 per cent of all reports - a 16 per cent increase from the previous year.

In Suffolk the more than £5.6million was lost across 233 cases.

Detective Superintendent Oliver Little, from the Lead Force Operations Room at the City of London Police, said: "Investment fraud continues to be a key focus area for the City of London because of its prevalence - which is evident from the stark figure of £649m that has been lost last year.

"It may seem obvious, but we would really emphasise the age-old 'if it is too good to be true it almost certainly is' mantra. Investment fraudsters will often be incredibly skilled in what they do and will spin a convincing and alluring pitch of how much money they can make you, in often a short amount of time. Do not be seduced by the promise of making "easy money" as the world of stocks and shares is anything but.

"Whether it's £200 or £200,0000, our advice is always the same - do your research independently, check if the company is FCA registered and never take financial advice via social media or from people who have approached you out of the blue. If it were that easy to make profit on an investment, we would all know about it."

Social media remained a key tool for fraudsters, with 36 per cent of all investment fraud reports linked to a social media platform. As was the case in 2023, WhatsApp was the most frequently used platform by scammers, appearing in 40 per cent of reports, followed by Facebook (18 per cent) and Instagram (14 per cent). Given this trend, individuals should be extremely wary of anyone contacting them via social media or messaging platforms who claims to be an investor or trader who can guarantee high returns.

The data also showed that fraudsters frequently impersonated well-known public figures to build credibility. Out of 537 reports, the most commonly used identity

was Martin Lewis (44 per cent), in all likelihood due to his reputation as a trusted financial expert.

What to look out for:

Being approached via social media: the use of social media platforms as an enabler was identified in 36 per cent of the reports. with WhatsApp being the most prevalent. If you are approached, out of the blue, by someone telling you they can make you quaranteed returns on an investment, then block the number and don't respond. For example, on Whatsapp you can do this by pressing and holding the message bubble, select 'Report' and then follow the instructions.

Investment opportunities that mention cryptocurrency, trading or stocks and shares: cryptocurrency and trading (unspecified) alone made up 75 per cent of all commodity types mentioned in Action

Fraud reports. These two categories hugely outweigh traditional investment in commodities like natural resources (oil and gas), energy, precious metals, alcohol and forex (foreign exchange) that were mentioned in fraud reports.

An advert which uses a well-known celebrity: over £10m was lost in 2024 to fraudsters who convinced victims to invest by using an influential identity like Martin Lewis, Elon Musk or Jeremy Clarkson. Al generated images and videos were produced which helped to promote the bogus investment schemes.

How to protect yourself from investment fraud

Investment opportunities: don't be rushed into making an investment. Remember, legitimate organisations will never pressure you into investing on the spot.

Seek advice first: before making significant financial decisions, speak with trusted friends or family members, or seek professional independent advice.

FCA register: use the Financial Conduct Authority's (FCA) register to check if the company is regulated by the FCA. If you deal with a firm (or individual) that isn't regulated, you may not be covered by the Financial Ombudsman Service (FOS) if things go wrong and you lose your money.

What to do if you've been a victim of investment fraud

You could be targeted again: fraudsters sometimes re-establish contact with previous victims claiming that they can help them recover lost money, this is just a secondary scam. Hang up on any callers that claim they can get your money back for you.

Identity theft: if you suspect your identity may have been stolen, you can check your credit rating quickly and easily online. You should do this every few months anyway, using a reputable service provider and follow up on any unexpected or suspicious results.

Legal advice: in many cases of fraud there is a close correlation between what may be considered fraud and the civil tort of deceit and/or breach of contract, for which there are civil litigation options. We would always advise that you seek professional legal advice or contact Citizens Advice to understand your options.

You can also contact the Financial Conduct Authority's consumer helpline on 0800 111 6768 or report suspicious businesses or individuals by using the reporting form on their website.

If you live in England, Wales and Northern Ireland and have been a victim of fraud or cybercrime, report it at www.actionfraud. police.uk or by calling 0300 123 2040. In Scotland, victims of fraud and cybercrime should report to Police Scotland on 101.

Please clean up after your dog

A practical guide for reducing the problem of dog fouling in your Community

The dog population of the UK is around 9 million, with the amount of excrement being produced probably exceeding 1,000 tonnes a day.

Dog mess is a nuisance and is associated with various diseases including Toxocara canis which is a roundworm whose eggs can be found in dog mess. This causes stomach upsets, sore throats, asthma and in rare cases blindness.

When irresponsible dog owners do not clear up, not only are they committing an offence but they are also leaving behind something which can be easily

picked up by young children or stood in by others.

Dog owners please remember:

- √ take enough bags when you take your dog(s) out
- √ bag it and bin it any street litter bin will do
- ✓ use your black household bin at home if no other bin is available.

Summer Gardening

Summer is the season of flowers, whether it's beds of perennials, shrubs and roses, or bedding plants from hanging baskets and containers. Although you're still busy, don't forget to sit down and enjoy the fruits of your labours. Believe me, it's all too easy to spend the whole time pottering and not relaxing! We should be free from the risk of frost in June, although it is not unheard of to get a frost early in the month, so keep checking the weather and keep fleece to hand if any frosts are forecast.

In early summer the routine maintenance of feeding, watering and deadheading plants begins. Ensure any trees or shrubs planted in winter are not suffering during dry periods and give them a good soak if necessary. It's also time to think about the seasons ahead, and in preparation for winter colour sow hardy seeds including Sweet Williams, Wallflowers and Pansies. Once any birds have fledged the nest make the first trim of yew, and leafy hedges such as beech or privet.

Come mid-summer it's important to keep on top of weeding, feeding, deadheading and watering. If you have a pond, keep it aerated, and the water level topped up. Remember to use de-chlorinator if using tap water. In dry weather, raise the height of your mower blades as grass will stay greener longer. If you water your lawn a depth of two inches of water is required on a weekly basis. To see how much water your lawn is receiving, place several straight sided containers (such as a tin can, mug or other similar container) on the lawn while you are watering. Then use a ruler to measure the depth of the water in the

container. I'm not a believer in watering the lawn (unless it's newly seeded or new turf) due to the amount of water required - even for my small lawn. It's not a bowling green, and any brown, dead patches will recover when it rains. Healthy lawns tend to recover quicker but if it doesn't re-grow, I'll simply re-seed a few patches in the autumn.

In late summer, pay attention to ericaceous plants grown in pots such as rhododendrons and azaleas. If the weather is dry, feed and water the plants, as the flower buds for next spring will be developing. It's also time to take semi-ripe cuttings of a wide range of hardy climbers, shrubs and trees. Semi-ripe cuttings are selected from healthy, undamaged stems from this season's growth. The base of the cutting should be firm whilst the tip is still flexible, take cuttings in the morning to avoid wilting. There are three main types of semi-ripe cuttings, however in this article I shall just detail the basic method. Simply use a sharp, clean tool and cut just below a leaf to leave a prepared cutting of 10-15cm (4-6") in length. Immediately put the cuttings into a plastic bag to reduce moisture loss. Remove the lowest leaves and soft tips from the cutting. Dip the cutting into hormone rooting powder, then insert the cuttings into suitable sized containers filled with seed compost. Water well and allow to drain before placing the container in a greenhouse, or cover with a clear plastic bag. and leave to root in a warm, light position out of direct sunlight. Rooting is quick in summer, however fungus and rots can cause severe losses. Regularly removing diseased material and ensuring good ventilation can help prevent any problems.

Lakenheath Parish Recorder

In the early 1950s, Suffolk Local History Council launched a scheme to appoint a volunteer Parish Recorder in every Suffolk village. I have had the privilege of serving as Lakenheath's Recorder for several years.

My role is to help preserve valuable historical material for future local historians by:

- 1. Recording present-day events to ensure they are properly documented.
- 2. Identifying historical items that might otherwise be overlooked or lost.

Each year, I compile an annual diary, which is archived at the Suffolk Records Office. The most recent published report, covering 2023, reflects how village life gradually returned to normal following the Covid pandemic and lockdowns. Reports from recent vears are available on our website www.lakenheathparishcouncil.gov.uk/ lakenheath-heritage.

If you are aware of any events or occurrences which should be recorded. please let me know for inclusion in the diary.

I am passionate about local history and understand the importance of preserving documents, records, and photographs many of which are unfortunately discarded. "Here is The News"

This is part of a story, "Here is The News," from the Parish website pages. It's a good example of how memories passed on from one generation to another can add useful knowledge of the village.

For many years our village relied on a town crier for information. Doris Ditchburn, (b.1909. d. 2004) left us many memories of the village from the end of the 19th century which were passed to the Heritage Group by her nephew, Prof. Raymond Bonnet.

The following memory would be from about 1914.



"The town crier was Mr. Allsop, known as 'Trotman', every little while there would be notices to give out, and of course they were not printed and put up on a notice board. He would come round after dark, usually about 6 o'clock wearing corduroy trousers, a big cape on his shoulders, a top hat and a bell."

Doris Ditchburn in an interview with Ray Bonnet.

Children followed Mr. Allsop along the High Street pretending to ring make-believe bells. We know of three town criers. In the early 20th century Mr. Allsop succeeded William Household, and Luke Coleman continued the tradition.

THE TOWN CRIER

T'was evening time when he Trundled down the village street In cordurovs of Khaki shade And gaiters to protect him from the cold His brawny shoulders covered with a cape. And with top hat and bell his news he told. His voice, familiar to the ear Would send his message forth so clear Across the cold night air. His first stop was the Bell Hotel. He drew deep breath, his tale to tell. "Ding Dong, Ding Dong" the bell rang out And village folk in lamp light dim With doors half open would listen to him "OYEZ, OYEZ, this is to give notice": A pause for breath, and then a loud, "Tonight at the Bell Hotel 7.30pm. prompt There'll be a letting of the droves for feed.

"OYEZ, OYEZ, OYEZ,"

His call he then repeated by the Bull Then to the Chequers telling all his news. His loud chimes filled the lanes with glorious sound

Which boomed across the bleak fen miles around.

Town Crier, though your solid age has gone In memory, now comes back your ancient song. "OYEZ, OYEZ, OYEZ."

On he trundles bright and gay, Another call to make, but wait The dim lit street begins to feel so weird, A howling dog, an owl hoots,

The Fenland bleak, space all around, Yet feet are firmly on the ground. Town Criers your solid age has gone Remembered only by your cry or song.

The poem is about the village 60 years before the Lakenheath Relief Channel was completed in the 1960's. Until then the Fen flooded regularly and before the oil street lights were installed in 1902 the village was completely dark at night. Village pubs were often used for auctions: the Bell, the Chequers and the Bull were probably the main ones, closely followed by the Plough, Tap and the Waggon and Horses. Also on the High Street was the small Star pub not far from Goward House. The Harbour and the Anchor were on Anchor Lane. Two other pubs, the High Bridge and the Swan, were well outside the village. The bidding for grazing rights on the droves mentioned in the poem probably goes back to medieval times.

A NEW PROJECT

Lakenheath Co-operative Society

When our Co-op was founded in 1892 life was very hard partly due to the agricultural depressions of the mid19th-early 20th century. Work on the land was difficult to find and prices of basic foods often made it hard to make ends meet.

In 1844 mill workers in Rochdale. Lancashire, decided to take matters into their own hands and supply 'members' with basic foods- flour, sugar, and oatmeal, sold at affordable prices in their own shop which was run solely in the members interests, with any profit being shared. Each member had a say in how their Cooperative was run and what it should sell. This was the model on which Co-op's are based today.

We have begun researching our Co-op's early days and some interesting discoveries are being made but we will need some help building a picture of the Co-op in the 1940's-1980's.

Can you help build a picture of our CO-OP? Have you got relatives who worked there, what products were sold, what was most popular, any funny stories? We hope this will include memories of both customers and employees. More information will follow asap. but please start thinking!

akenheath is fortunate to have a good network of footpaths and the Parish Walk normally explores these every other Sunday afternoon, helping you to enjoy the beautiful area in which we live as well as keeping the footpaths open. However, as I, and indeed some of the other regulars have been ill, you may well have turned up and found no one there. I hope that I will soon have enough energy to start leading walks again. I will post the dates on the Wings Road Car Park notice board and in the Library.

Normally, we meet at Wings Road Car Park at 2 pm but don't expect anyone there before 1.55pm. Walks are about 5 miles long and take about 2 hours. If we see hares, deer and other wild-life we stop and watch them. Sturdy footwear. preferably boots, is essential. There is no charge and everyone is welcome.

Please check the notice boards for the dates. I hope that you will join us when the new dates are posted. Walking will give you a new perspective on life as well as the opportunity to make new friends and get to know the beautiful area in which you live.

FOOTPATH NEWS

I am not sure about the state of the footpaths as I have not been well enough to go on a walk. All the paths were due to be cut in in May. So, if you go walking after the middle of June and find a footpath is overgrown or impassible, it is important that you report it to Suffolk County Council. Hopefully then the County Council will take action to get it cut or take whatever remedial action is required.

To report a footpath problem to the County Council, go on their website and select Roads and Transport, then public rights of way in Suffolk, then report a public right of way issue. You will then be able to open up a map and pinpoint the location and, on the left hand side, select the type of problem and give details.

If you prefer to telephone you can ring James Pickerin, the County Footpath Officer for this area, on 01284 741352 and leave a message if he is out.

If we want the footpaths to be kept open, it is essential that problems are reported to the County Council.

PROTECT YOURSELF FROM INSECT BITES


As well as the usual midges, mosquitos and wasps, there are a lot of cleg flies and tics around especially on the Warren, Santon Downham and similar walks. I have also had several clegs in my garden. Tics will climb up legs and burrow into the skin and can cause Lyme Disease.

Clegs are small black flies with gauzy wings about the size of a female clothes moth. They feed on mammalian blood and can bite through clothing. They fly silently and have very thin spidery legs so you cannot feel them on your skin, and you cannot feel them bite you. The first you will know is when you feel the skin burning and swollen with red hot needles going through it. So, protection is necessary by using insect repellent and wearing gaiters to protect ankles and legs. I have found After Bite useful if you apply it as soon as you realise you have been bitten and keep on applying it. You may need to see a pharmacist or a doctor.

Country Music Night hosted by Wing Song

Wing Song will be hosting a Country Music Night on Thursday 5 June at Lakenheath Methodist Church. The concert is in aid of Guide Dogs and will feature the duo, their supporting band, guest musicians and two Guide Dogs with their foster carers, who will be giving a short talk.

Wing Song was formed in 2019 by Linda Spencer and Sue Crowe. Neither are strangers to the music industry. Linda has worked with B J Cole, recording the back catalogue for Interworld Music Publishing and Sue has supported artists including Kenny Ball, the Wurzels and Sounds of The Platters. Both Linda and Sue sing lead and harmonise and Sue is a competent keyboard player, guitarist and song writer.

Jim played with some top country bands. In 1999/2000 he was on the National Theatre Tours 'Stand By Your Man' Tammy Wynette and 'Queen's of Country'. He continues to tour the British Country Music Clubs and Festivals with Black Steel Duo/ Trio, Jeff Gallant Band, The Stories and Eastern Sons of Soil and record for British Country Artistes. Also recording for Suzi Quatro, Marty Wilde, Sarah Jay Hawley (Massive Attack), Atlantic Junction and Wing Song.

Frog on drums who started playing in 1963 inspired by Buddy Rich and Joe Morello. EMI gave his band Giggles a recording contract and that led to him being on stage with many excellent bands including Queen, Genesis, Sweet, Zombies and Argent. Frog has also toured the UK playing for several country bands.

Phil Louis guitarist and comedian who has been in the music business for a number of years and with the Phil Louis duo supported Lonnie Donnegan and Foster and Allen. Phil says his TV appearances include Crimewatch and Embarrassing Bodies.

Pete Theobald on bass and twelve string guitar. After learning the guitar as a child, Pete took up the bass in the early '80s. A Lakenheath local, Pete has played bass in Christian band New Life for 35 years and also plays for the Cliff and the Shadows Tribute band the Silhouettes and the Sunset Trip

Guests include singer songwriter and performer S-Jay, Bert Woodhead who recently played bass on Wing Song's recent release 'Song In My Head'. Brilliant violinist Vee, who recently formed a duo with Pete Theobald and local country singer Luke.







Wildlife news from RSPB Lakenheath Fen

At this time of year, the reserve is at its best! On a walk around you can expect to hear a wide variety of birdsong, much of which is coming from species that have migrated here to take advantage of our warm summers. As the reserve heats up, insects begin to emerge and this provides the food needed to support these extra birds.

Viewed from the riverbank, the Hockwold Washes saw the first arrivals in mid-March. in the form of wading birds like Black-tailed godwit. Dunlin and Curlew. These are 'passage' waders. They aren't stopping with us but using the lagoon as a pitstop to refuel on a longer journey north to their breeding grounds in the Arctic circle, Scandinavia, Greenland, or even the UK's uplands. They 'wade' through shallow water as their name suggests, sensing and sifting the soft mud to pick out small worms and insects rich in protein and calories. This passage continues over several weeks through Spring. It's worth looking too for the reserve's only migratory duck, the Garganey, a very intricately patterned small duck who breed on the reserve in small numbers. They like the weedy edges of the water, and the male duck (drake) has a strong and clear white eyestripe, unlike any other duck you can find here.

It wasn't long before small birds like Chiffchaff and Blackcap began to sing, and we never know if the birds we hear are actually migrants! Most of them will be, but a small (and increasing) number of each species overwinters in the UK, thanks to our milder winters making it easier for them to find insect food year-round. Then, in late March come the 'true' migrants, like Swallow and Sand Martin. These zip through the sky, especially over water, hunting small insects and they often flock together. You will be able to see

these, as well as Swifts and House Martins here all summer and into early autumn.

Our specialist reed bed birds include Sedge and Reed warblers. These arrived here five days apart in early April this year and although their calls sound similar, they look quite different. They normally hide well within the reeds but if you watch patiently you may see them climb up the stems to sing. Sedge warblers have a much more streaky and stripey appearance, whereas Reed warblers are very plain looking. We also get small numbers of the rarer Grasshopper warbler here. They sounds just as you might expect, emitting a lengthy 'reeling' call which sounds a bit like a freewheeling bicycle, or a fisherman's reel unwinding. They slowly swivel their head when calling so it can get louder and guieter for the observer, depending on if the bird is facing you at that moment. It's a high-pitched song and some older people, especially men, struggle to hear it as we lose the upper ranges of our hearing as we age.

Many people come to see us in search of the beautiful Cuckoo, which is known more for it's song than looks. It's a bird many people remember from their past, as they

used to be much more common, and they are delighted to find a place where their lovely two-note soft 'Cook-hoo' can be regularly heard. During May and June you will struggle to walk around the reserve on a nice day without hearing at least one or two! You may also see them flying slowly over the reed beds, especially male birds, as they display to watching females. Cuckoos feed mostly on caterpillars, especially larger hairy ones that other birds leave behind. Widespread use of pesticides in our green spaces sadly reduces the numbers of big caterpillars around, and therefore the Cuckoos themselves.

Hobbies are another bird we are known for that will be easy to see in the coming weeks if you visit us. Hobbies are roughly Kestrelsized birds of prey with dark grey feathers on their back, and dark spots and streaks on a whitish belly, with a patch of rusty-red feathers around the base of their legs. They are fast and acrobatic, hunting large insects like dragonflies and beetles in the air, as well as small birds when they can catch them. They feed in flight, and nest high up in tall trees like poplars and oaks, in quiet places with few people around. If you visit us on a warm day, you should see some numbers build up. Over fifty during May and then reduce in June to a few pairs, as most leave this reserve to find their breeding grounds locally. Afternoons are best for looking for Hobbies, as it takes a few hours for their prey (often dragonflies) to warm up and get going in the mornings. Look out for their rapid and swooping flights over open areas like the reed beds or the Hockwold Washes.

If you do come in the morning however, this tends to be the best time to see and hear the beautiful bird that is on the Lakenheath village sign, the Bittern. This camouflaged Heron is the reason the reserve was created in 1995 and our latest breeding surveys for this year indicate at least 14 male birds have set up territory here this Spring. On our weekly surveys we listen for their incredible low, loud 'boom' issued from within the reeds, designed to attract females. It's

common to see one chasing another too, as males argue over territory or pursue females.

We also have Kingfishers spotted regularly on the reserve, and this is another top bird on many peoples' lists of what they want to see when they visit us. The viewpoint pools, as well as along the river and Mere Hide are good places to look. Patience helps with this one, and with luck you may spot one as it does a circuit of it's favourite fishing spots looking for a meal.

As well as the birds, keep an eye out for a wide range of butterflies and dragonflies. In 2024 we recorded 22 different species of each. If you have binoculars with you, use these at close range to really appreciate the beautiful colours and patterns on their bodies and wings, which have to be seen to be believed!

Visiting Us

If you haven't been before, you can find RSPB Lakenheath Fen just north of the level crossing at Lakenheath Station. We are on the left as you head towards Hockwold, and we have two large blue roadside signs at our entrance.

If you are an RSPB member, entry is free, otherwise its £4 per adult (£5 from 1 June 2025), £3 for students (please show ID) and £2 for Under 18's. The first child in a family is free, as well as Under 5's, and the RSPB is currently within a two-year trial of free entry for 16-24 year olds (to try to reduce barriers to nature for young people).

We have a network of trails, some of which are hard surfaced and suitable for buggies and manual wheelchairs, and we have a new Tramper mobility scooter available to hire for free (donations for upkeep appreciated). The Visitor Centre and toilets are open daily from 9am to 5pm.

The digital phone switchover

What you need to know

What is the digital phone switchover?

The UK's telephone network is changing. Between now and 2027 most telephone providers will be moving their customers from old analogue landlines over to new upgraded landline services using digital technology.


This means services that rely on the old landline system such as home phones and healthcare devices will be switched over.

How will it affect me/what do I need to do?

The good news is – your landline isn't going anywhere and for most consumers and businesses, this change will be straightforward. In fact, many customers are already making the switch when they upgrade to full fibre broadband.

Your telecoms provider such as Virgin Media O2 or BT should contact you before the switchover to check in and discuss what you need to do to make sure your service isn't affected. However, we're encouraging everyone to know what to expect.

If you have an internet connection, the change may be as simple as plugging your phone into your broadband router rather than the socket on the wall.



Your telecoms provider should contact you before the switchover to let you know if you'll be affected.

People who use personal alarms or health monitoring devices should check if the switchover will affect how they work.



Do you or someone you know depend on their landline for use of a telecare device connected to the phone line such as a fall monitor, lifeline or personal alarm?

If yes, then please notify your communications provider (the people you pay for your landline) and check with your monitor/alarm provider whether your device is digitally enabled so that they can advise on how the switch might affect the service of the devices.

If you have other devices connected to your phone line, such as burglar alarm systems, your alarm service provider might need to upgrade your device to make sure it is compatible. If you are unsure about how a device in your home or business might be affected, it is recommended you contact the equipment supplier or device manufacturer to find out whether it will still work on a digital phone line.

In an emergency

Digital landlines cannot carry a power connection, so in the event of a power cut they will not work. If you have a mobile phone this can still be used, but if you've no other means of calling the emergency services your telecoms provider will offer a solution to allow calls to be made to emergency services.

You should tell your telecoms provider now if you have no other way of making emergency calls.

Concerned about the switchover?

If you're worried about your devices, please contact the supplier, provider or company who provide them. They will be able to give you more information.

Expand vour reading horizons! by Lorraine Gregory

Finding the type of books you enjoy reading is a wonderful thing, you always know what shelves at the library to look at and it's easy to search for them online.

My favourite genres to read were always Fantasy, Historical and Crime and for a long time I didn't really try anything else.

BUT over the last few years I have expanded my reading choices and experimented with different genres and I've found some amazing books because of it. Part of that change was due to being recommended new books on social media that sounded interesting and deciding to give them a go and part of it was because it's easy to try out different books by using my library.

I'm perfectly happy to try a different type of book if I can borrow it from the library first because if I don't like it I can simply take it back and it doesn't matter. I haven't wasted any money AND I know the author is still going to benefit due to something called Public Lending Right.

Public Lending Right is the way that authors get paid a small sum every time someone borrows a book from a library. Once a year they collect the figures and send the author a statement with how many loans their books had and the corresponding fee. This extra money is extremely important to authors who generally don't earn very much as a rule and also a wonderful way to see how many people have been reading their books!

One way to expand your reading is to try something from a genre that you enjoy that's been slightly adapted - for example - Cosy Crime - made famous by Richard Osman's series about murder solving O.A.P's in the Thursday Murder Club. There is now a huge selection of these charming tales to choose from. Although I still enjoy a gritty crime novel I do also enjoy something more gentle and less likely to give me nightmares! Trv Miss Beeton's Murder Agency or Vera Wong's Unsolicited Advice for Murderers.

Another new Cosy combination is Cosy Fantasy where instead of orcs and goblins going to war and magic destroying the world you're more likely to find an orc opening a tea shop! I find these books huge fun to read, I still get the world building but again it's in a more gentle way that allows me to simply enjoy wandering through this new world without fearing for my life!

Try The Spell Shop by Sarah Beth Durst, The Phoenix Keeper by S.A Maclean or Legends and Lattes by Travis Baldree.

More recently I've discovered the excellent combination of Fantasy Crime where the characters are solving crimes in a fantasy world and the combination of two of my favourite genres has been entirely delightful.

Read The Tainted Cup and A drop of Corruption by Robert Jackson Bennett or The Voyage of the Damned by Francis White.

I love the fact there are all sorts of exciting books out there just waiting for me to discover them so maybe you too could expand your reading horizons and find something new at your library!

Nick Timothy MP meets Lakenheath Primary pupils to answer their questions

Nick Timothy — the MP for West Suffolk - answered questions from pupils at Lakenheath Primary School when he visited the school recently (on Friday 28 February).

He was given a tour by headteacher Michael Tingey and answered questions from members of the school council. including the following:

What made you want to be an MP? How are new laws and rules made at the Houses of Parliament?

What would you like to change about the UK?

What do you most enjoy about your job?

In answering the last of these, Mr Timothy said one of the things he enjoys most is visiting places around West Suffolk such as Lakenheath Primary School.

The pupils also put to Mr Timothy important questions about local issues in Lakenheath. including about work to fix potholes, the need for more local affordable housing, shops and services and the demand for more public transport.

Nick said following the visit: "It was delightful to be guizzed by Lakenheath Primary's pupils who asked intelligent and relevant questions in a poised, clear and eloquent manner.

"All the pupils were a huge credit to their school, which has a peaceful, calming and welcoming atmosphere and excellent leadership in Mr Tingey.

"It was a great pleasure to meet the children and the staff, and I also valued the chance to see the school's facilities and outdoor space, which — as well being as an activities area - allows the children to learn about nature and looking after animals. It's a wonderful school."









Here we are again, another season over and quite a poor one compared to recent seasons.

Pre-season went quite well but as always, a few decent players turn up and you're thinking we may have a good team this year, but then after a couple of friendlies some disappear and sign elsewhere.

You then chase round to find replacements and it's a struggle as other teams have same idea and some are offering more than we can.

But we find a few, who come with a decent reputation, then, one of them just doesn't bother turning up after a couple of games, then another decides to move on. Then you realise that those replacements you signed really are not good enough, but you're stuck with them. Then your goalkeeper decides to move to a team closer to home and decent keepers are like hens' teeth. It obviously became more of a struggle because when you start losing a few games, you're suddenly fighting relegation so it's near impossible to get reinforcements.

This all culminated in our manager, Trevor Collins, being relieved of his position in November. Its a shame it didn't work out. Trevor is a really nice guy, some would argue a bit too nice.

Coach Steve Holder took over as interim manager till at least the end of the season and brought in ex player Craig Nurse as first team coach. He continued to try find and players which is not easy over the Christmas period with players settled with their clubs. However, he did manage to bring a few on board, especially some on dual registration from Bury Town and then managed to sign the Rocha brothers from Downham Town

and we started to pick up after Christmas and a run of wins and draws took us well clear of the bottom two relegation spots. Notable results drawing with Fakenham, drawing with Downham Town (and missing a penalty in last minute), drawing with Walsham and a draw at Dereham. These four clubs finished 2nd 3rd 4th and 5th in the league, yet we struggled against the 'lower' sides, funny old game!

Once safe I think the impetus dropped off and we just went through the motions seeing the season out.

Talking with Holds (who is staying as manager) and Nursey, they are working hard already trying to get a few players in for next season, one which I hope will be better than this last season.

Pre-season training starts on June 12th, and some tasty friendlies are already arranged, but because of continued pitch maintenance they will all be away at Mildenhall, Debenham, West Wratting, Wroxham and either Bury Town or Histon. Can't wait, been too long already.

The club are busy behind the scenes as having to extend the pitch again, plus all the normal 'stuff' like re-seeding, fertilizing and topsoil on the pitch, improvements to the driveway and entrance.

So, all looking positive off the field, just have to get it right on the field, but I'll still be there (can't get rid of this oldie!) and so will many more, trying our best to make it a great little club and hopefully a successful club. We enjoy your support so keep coming and cheering the lads on, it is appreciated.

LAKENHEATH LUNCHEON CLUB

The Lakenheath Social and Luncheon Club. to give it the full name, was first thought about after a conversation with Mrs Neal, the Health Visitor. who had come to do a check on my two year old daughter in the September of 1979. Just in that conversation she mentioned that she met many lonely people in her job that would benefit from having a meal and conversation with new people.

I was already helping Social Services with a couple of other people in the village so I discussed it with them and it was decided to call a meeting to measure the interest. We knew we would need the support of other helpers to get it off the ground. At the meeting a committee was formed with Mr Roberts agreeing to be the chair person and Margaret Fulham became the secretary (a position I still hold). Mrs Neal and a representative from Social Services attended and offered their support.


A jumble sale was organised as the hall did not have any cooking equipment. The money raised at this was supplemented with a grant from Social Services and we were able to purchase the items we required. We were also given a donation of food by Mr and Mrs Derek Palmer. It was agreed with the committee at the British Legion Club that we could use their premises and the first lunch was in March 1980.

This was attended by 40 people and we had a picture and an article in the Bury Free Press. Everyone was very enthusiastic and after the first week a team of gentlemen took it upon themselves to come and put out the tables and chairs each week. The customers began arriving before lunchtime and some would play cards and others would have a game of darts. We met every week except for school holidays as most of the helpers had young children. In fact, a couple of us had children who were too young to go to school so they used to come with us and they always made a beeline for Mr John Brown who each week had a pocket full of sweets for them. Ambrose also used to keep the helpers supplied with aniseed balls.

We only meet the last Wednesday of the month now, since beginning again, after the Covid lockdown. We have fewer volunteers at the moment. We cook all fresh meat and vegetables each time we meet. More often than not, we cook a roast dinner and dessert and make the very reasonable charge of £7. Obviously this does not always fully cover the costs and recently we needed to buy some new equipment. We have been going 45 years and nothing lasts forever.

We were very fortunate to have been awarded a very generous donation by the Christian Enterprise Foundation (CEF) and recently another donation of £420 was given to us by the local Chalk Farm Shooting Syndicate. It is very gratifying to be supported by village organisations as they realise that we are providing a worthwhile service. We are always ready to welcome new members. If you don't want to eat but have an hour to spare you can always come and help with preparation, or spend an hour on the clean up.





Hello Lakenheath Parish

I'd like to bore you with some things about MOT and a few rules surrounding them!! We get asked a lot of these questions by many people and joking apart, I hope you find the following of use:

What is an MOT?

An MOT is an annual safety / road worthiness check on a vehicle that is over 4 years old. There is around 120 items that are checked which are, amongst other things, brakes, suspension, tyres, structural stability, emissions, lights and seat belts. The MOT testers are already experienced mechanics and then take extensive training to become a tester and then have to pass a very onerous test every year to keep their licence. They know what they are doing and your safety is literally in their hands.

An MOT can only check the condition of your car at the time of presentation and at all other times, you are bound by the law to keep your car in a road worthy condition; just some simple weekly checks on tyres, brakes, lights, keeping your eyes on all these things would be good! The laws surrounding

road worthiness are different to MOT rules; yes, they correlate but the police have extensive powers if they think a vehicle is unroadworthy. Best avoided! If you are in doubt, we do a free MOT check which is basically an MOT and we can advise on areas of concern.

How can I check if my MOT is due?

By far the best way is to call us at Central Garage Lakenheath (01842) 860226)!

The second-best way is to use the government website - Check the MOT status of a vehicle - GOV.UK - the gov. uk check is free, and it is worth a bit of care to make sure you are on the right site as others will charge you! You can also check previous MOT history on another part of the gov website, and this is very handy when buying a car.

What should I do if my MOT has expired?

As obvious as it sounds, you need to get an MOT ASAP! There is no grace period as some people think; when it has expired it is, er, well, expired.

It is illegal to drive a car without an MOT and if picked up by the boys in blue, it will mean a fine and points. Not having an MOT also invalidates

your insurance so you could get a fine and points for that also! It all gets very expensive very quickly.

The only two times it is legal to drive a car without an MOT is when you are on your way to a booked in MOT or booked in to a garage for repairs leading to an MOT. That is literally it!! If your car is more than 40 years old, it is MOT exempt so doesn't need one. You do still have to keep it in a road worthy condition! There is one exemption on this and it needs an MOT if it is "highly modified". There is little guidance on this so I can't give much help here! You know who you are! How this is covered by insurance varies from insurer to insurer so if in doubt, please check with your insurer. You cannot tax your car without an MOT. While this sounds obvious, it is sometimes the case that if you pay the car tax by direct debit and the tax vear does not correspond with the MOT year, you may not realise your MOT has run out until you get a letter

If it passes, it is immediately posted on the gov.uk website and more importantly, appears on the police database. You do not need the certificate if it passes, although we happily give these. We do issue the certificate if it fails; we are nice like that (it is actually a DVLA / VOSA requirement).

kindly advising you that your tax is not

applicable and here is a nice fine!

What if my car fails its MOT? Can I drive it home?

There are two scenarios here. If your MOT is still "in date" then technically you are still MOT'd. if you get stopped by the police and they check your car and find it to be unroadworthy, if you have an MOT fail certificate that highlights certain errors, vou'd be hard pushed to use the "sorry guv, I didn't know argument"!! You will get a fine and maybe points.

If your MOT is out of date and you have an MOT failure, driving it is up to you; as an MOT station, we cannot stop you. But the big but, driving a car without an MOT is illegal.

How can I be reminded of when my MOT is due?

Of course you can stick alerts on your phone, sticky notes on your fridge / dashboard, and so on but who actually does this?

You can set up an alert thing on gov. uk or, the easiest way is to give us a call and we can add you to our MOT reminder service – you will never miss another MOT!

SPRING UPDATE FOR THE **NEST BOX PROJECT AT LAKENHEATH CEMETERY**

I wanted to give the readers an update on the nest box monitoring at Lakenheath Cemetery.

The most recent checks were carried out on the 12th April. Of the 8 hole fronted boxes, one had a finished and lined nest and one had been used as a roost at some point. I returned on the 20th of April and found 7 warm eggs in the box. Going by the presence of a few feathers and the size of the eggs it is likely this is a Blue Tit nest.

Unfortunately on checking on the 4th of May, expecting there to be recently hatched chicks or warm eggs, the 7 eggs were cold. Cold eggs means the adult had stopped incubating for some reason. This is a little disappointing but the boxes will continue to be checked in case of new nests which may be second attempts.

There will be a further update in a future issue of Lakenheath News.

Whilst checking the nest boxes I have been keeping an eye out for species that nest openly rather than in cavities such as Blackbirds and Robins. Both these species are present with at least one pair of Robins and two pairs of Blackbirds.

Given this is the first year for all the boxes the low occupation is not a huge surprise. The location of the boxes will be tweaked over the winter to best take advantage of the new growth following the pollarding of the main avenue of trees, where 6 of the boxes are located.

The data gathered so far contributes to the British Trust for Ornithology's (BTO) Nest Record Scheme, a national effort that has monitored nesting birds since 1939. If any readers have nest boxes in their gardens and are able to submit their records, they can find more information on the BTO website. Sign up to either Nesting Neighbours or the Nest Record Scheme. There is lots of information and guidance on how everyone can get involved.
