#### 13.3.2020

The Bury Free Press reported that Lakenheath couple, Wayne Watson and Emily Power are to continue with wedding plans despite a huge motor bike accident which has left Wayne with life changing injuries. He is paralysed from the neck down.

#### 11/03/2020

The World Health Organization (WHO) has declared the novel coronavirus (COVID-19) outbreak a global pandemic. At a news briefing, WHO Director-General, Dr. Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus, noted that over the past 2 weeks, the number of cases outside China increased 13-fold and the number of countries with cases increased threefold.

#### 16.3.2020

The Prime Minister, Boris Johnston MP says "now is the time for everyone to stop non-essential contact and travel"

#### 19.3.2020

The Lakenheath Coronavirus Action Group was formed Essentially to find a resolution in looking after the lone elderly and vulnerable people of the village. A leaflet is to be designed with the ultimate aim of delivering same to each house in the village. Notes from meeting in the pack.

#### 23.3.2020

PM announces the first lockdown in the UK, ordering people to "stay at home"

#### 26.3.2020

Lockdown measure legally come into force.

The Coronavirus Group had a further meeting. Leaflet agreed upon and will be delivered to each dwelling in the parish with the Lakenheath Times.

It is envisaged that incoming calls will be one off requests and further requests will be made from individuals as needed. Those Good Neighbours that are self-isolating have agreed that they will take on those individuals that require a regular phone call. A list is to be compiled of those that are already receiving calls in this way from Good Neighbours and the Emergency Planning Team.

Advice from Community Action Suffolk is not to handle cash which prevents volunteers from doing shopping. Three business in Brandon have got together and are offering a home delivery service to Lakenheath three times per week. These businesses will take orders over the phone along with card payments. Alan Gyte agreed to speak with the manager of the co-op to see if something similar could operate in the village. The co-op could take orders, make them up and the group's volunteers could deliver.

The food bank currently has good stock levels and Cllr. Colin Noble agreed to find out about the additional funding that is available for food banks. Basic packs are already available for delivery where required.

Gerald will speak to the co-op to ask if milk and potatoes could be given as a priority to the food bank.

#### 27.3.2020

The Bury Free Press reported that a family managed to escape unharmed from a blaze which engulfed a bungalow. The fire started in an outbuilding and spread to the bungalow.

#### 30.3.20

Drivers were granted a 6-month exemption from MOT testing. Drivers who have an MOT test due before 1 August will be granted the 6-month extension. For example, if your MOT is due on 31 July, it'll be extended to 31 January 2021.

#### 2.4.2020

This was the first month that we were in lockdown. No one knew for how long this would be. The Coronavirus Action Group meeting was informed that the Co-Op will take orders over the phone but have to collect cash from the person and pay it over accordingly. They do not have a facility to take payment over the phone.

West Suffolk Council will provide a list next week of shops that do offer a delivery service to Lakenheath.

Confirmation had been received that the £600k made available for food banks is available with 24 hours of request.

#### 8.4.2020

The Coronavirus Action Group meeting was informed that Vince had carried out approx. 6 foodbank deliveries.

Positive feedback had been received from resident's receiving a phone call. Around 50 households are being contacted, a proactive approach may be useful in the future.

Fairshare / Co-op Cllr Colin Noble to send Vince information regarding the County Council initiative.

Vince agreed to advise parishioners using the Lakenheath foodbank of help available via the group and ask them to make contact. Normal systems at the foodbank will remain in operation.

Social Services are to be contacted to let them know about the group. Aware of a resident in Quayside who doesn't have any family members to help as they are self-isolating.

Although residents may run of out of cash, deliveries are available from various sources.

Supermarkets are increasing the delivery slots available and Robert at Feltwell Golf Course if offering daily delivery of a hot meal.

#### 11.4.20

The first coocoo heard in Lakenheath

#### 16.4.2020

Lockdown extended for at least three weeks. The Government sets out five tests that must be met before restrictions can be eased.

The Coronavirus Action Group were informed by the Parish Clerk that requests are settling in to a patten, but could possibly increase in-line with April Lakenheath Times being delivered with information the group and options that Parishioners can use.

The Families Communities Officer for West Suffolk who is managing calls for Home but not Alone initiative has not had to send any calls to Lakenheath or Beck Row and this shows that our system is working on a local level.

Mark's Fruit and Veg. Mark is no longer delivering meat and bakery goods. He has had contact with CJ's and has agreed with them to pass these orders over to Louise as he was being inundated with orders and has now cut ties with the Meat Market and Hyam's. It was confirmed that Louise is also using her contacts to supply household good such as toilet rolls etc. where she could.

#### 29.4.2020

The Coronavirus Action Group were informed that this week there had been 14 calls, a total of 111 to date. There is no shortages of companies doing food deliveries and that the calls to the Coronavirus line could be dropping as villagers get used to a new way of shopping. In the main the requirement is for Prescription pick up and delivery. The current system is working very well.

Update on the befriending service was that the Good Neighbours team are supporting with regular phone calls and contact. It was also mentioned that a Parish Councillor is also calling the keep fit group and the Emergency Helpline group.

Local businesses are to be thanked for their support and help during these current times.

Suffolk County Council, Lakenheath Parish Council and WSDC will be laying a wreath for VE day at 11am and requires one side of the chain to be removed around the village war memorial as a health and safety requirement on the day. This event is not to be publicised in advance because of concerns about social distancing but is happy for The Heritage group to take pictures to upload to social media after the event.

#### 2.5.20

We're now in our sixth week of lockdown and the Prime Minister has returned to work. There's been a lot of change for us all to deal with, whether it's new ways of working together or new routines at home.

#### May 2020

Leo Grimwood, a 9-year-old from Lakenheath has raised £420 for charity by running 3 km. He decided to complete the run after seeing that NHS staff were being affected while helping those with coronavirus. Leo's father, Daniel Grimwood helped him to set up a just giving page, with all proceeds of the run going to NHS charities Together. His initial target was £50 but that was exceeded.

#### 10.5.2020`

The government has started to outline a relaxation of the lockdown rules and possible measures for organisations to return to their usual places of work. The UK guidance makes it clear that people should continue to work from home where they can. With effect from 13.5.20 return to work if they can avoiding public transport where possible. Many local businesses have changed the way they operate so they can continue providing services to their local community

#### 13.5.2020

The Coronavirus action group is running very smoothly therefore the need for phone meetings will be rescheduled fortnightly.

#### 27.5.2020

The Coronavirus Action Group has received 155 calls to date. Although every household has received at least two communications about the group, a small number of referrals are still coming in from Home but not Alone, a District Council initiative.

It was confirmed that the Foodbank is okay and referrals from the group have always been dealt with promptly, even when requests have included special dietary requirements.

Other towns in Suffolk have reported much larger numbers of request for food parcels.

A couple of residents who have received food parcels direct from the government have reported that they have far too much food and they have been referred to the foodbank to donate any surplus.

Although the markets are re-opening, Mark in Brandon has confirmed that he will carry on with his Saturday deliveries to Lakenheath until at least the 15th of June.

The Government introduced a Track and Trace system to work where people are in close proximity to others such as pubs take away restaurants. When contacted by text or email, people are sent a link to the NHS Test and Trace website to enter details of recent contacts. These details can also be shared over the phone. As well as names, contact tracers will also ask for the email addresses, home address and phone numbers of those who may have been exposed to Covid-19.

#### 29.5.20

The Bury Free Press Headline was that the headteacher of a Lakenheath school which was told to improve by inspectors this month said changes are under way to return it to its previously 'good' rating.

Lakenheath Community Primary School was rated as 'requires improvement' in an Ofsted report published last week after an inspection in March flagged shortcomings in the school's leadership, management and quality of education.

The report said early years reading lessons at the Mill Road school were 'not good enough' and that pupils' skills were 'not developed in a coherent way'.

It continued: "Children in the early years do not have enough opportunities to practise core skills of reading, writing and mathematics in either their play or with an adult. They are not making the progress that they ought to be.

"Leaders need to ensure that opportunities for practice are planned in and that staff are confident in how to develop these early key skills."

But the report also rated behaviour and personal development at the school as 'good' and said that headteacher Sally Esom and her staff had 'successfully begun to turn this decline around'. It added that pupils at the school are 'happy', 'well-supported' and that there is a 'strong focus on developing pupils' personal development'.

Miss Esom said: "We will be continuing to review our curriculum over the coming months to streamline our topics and improve teacher, and therefore pupil, skills.

#### 31st May 2020

#### 1.6.2020

Lakenheath Community primary school reopened their doors to the early years, year 1 and year 6. A cap had been placed for a maximum of 80 children to ensure safe social distance and maximum safety. Parents were asked to indicate attendance on a first served priority. Children are grouped in pods of 15 with teachers / support staff; isolated from each other group. Attendance first week back was 60. Lunch is placed outside the rooms of each group in isolation. Very strict handwashing regime and areas marked out for no go areas. Each entrance is strictly controlled with social distance measures in place for parents, drop off and pickup. The system seems to be working well.

For safety the school governors agreed that they will not open the rest of the school to more even if the gov says so!!

#### 5.6.2020

West Suffolk Council announced that it has recorded its best return yet on its £14.5million solar farm in Lakenheath.

The authority said the Toggam Farm facility produced 2,007MWh in May - with sunny weather helping up to 65 per cent of the nation's power supply come from renewable sources.

West Suffolk has stated the farm is an investment in both green energy and a sustainable boost for their finances. A record £411,000 of income was taken in May.

Lakenheath RSPB reserve reopened parts of their grounds to the public.

#### 12.6.2020

The West Suffolk Garden Waste Brown Bin scheme which was stopped in March is being reinstated with effect from the 12<sup>th</sup> June collection in Lakenheath.

#### 15.6.2020

Following lockdown the non-essential shops were allowed to reopen in England.

### 48th Fighter Wing downed aircraft

RAF LAKENHEATH, UNITED KINGDOM - A U.S. Air Force F-15C Eagle crashed at approximately 0940 today in the North Sea. The aircraft was from the 48<sup>th</sup> Fighter Wing, RAF Lakenheath, United Kingdom. At the time of the accident, the aircraft was on a routine training mission with one pilot on board. The cause of the crash as well as the status of the pilot are unknown at this time, and U.K. Search and Rescue have been called to support.

As soon as additional details become available, they will be provided.

The wreckage was later found together with the body of the pilot.

#### 17.6.2020

Update given by Cllr Noble to the Coronavirus Action Group on the Government track and trace app.

It was noted that Mark's Fruit and Veg had returned to the markets and would no longer be delivering in the village.

Agreed that meeting would take place monthly going forward and that the next meeting would be a full debriefing meeting looking at figures, best practices and improvements to be made.

#### 23.6.20

Boris Johnson, the Prime Minister has announced that the two-metre rule will be relaxed from 4 July, when pubs, bars, cafes, art galleries, museums, hotels and cinemas are set to reopen after months of lockdown

"This means sticking to two metres distancing where we are able, washing our hands regularly, wearing face coverings in public and working from home whenever possible." The prime minister also announced a reduction in the two-metre social distancing rule to "one metre-plus".

The new guidance will also allow friends and families from two households to meet indoors and stay overnight.

People 'shielding' due to their health also received news that from July 6 they would be allowed to meet with up to groups of six outside their home or form a support bubble if in a single adult household.

Then as of August 1 those classed as clinically extremely vulnerable would be advised they would no longer need to shield.

Boris Johnson urged parents to "get their kids back into school" as he addressed the issues of worsening inequalities for children during the coronavirus lockdown at the final daily press briefing at No 10 Downing Street. The prime minister said the Covid-19 crisis had been "unfair" in its effects on children's education.

#### 24.6.2020

#### 28.6.2020

St Marys Church gave the following information: It is with very great pleasure we can announce that, following the change in guidance, St Mary's will be open for private prayer on Wednesdays from 1pm – 6pm Subject to detailed guidance from Her Majesty's Government, we expect to open for public worship Sunday 5th July at 11am, Holy Communion.

We expect this pattern to continue for the next few weeks.

#### 30.6.2020

The Coronavirus Action group were informed that since lock down 14 weeks ago Good Neighbours had carried out 73 jobs, an average of 5 per week down from the norm of 12-15 per week. This is partly due to not being able to offer transport, with reinstatement of this service now being investigated.

Cllr Noble gave an update on how the government are working with counties using postcode data and test and trace. There is the potential for a spike which will require some residents to self-isolate again.

It was confirmed that the Emergency Planning Group are continuing with their weekly chats to vulnerable residents. The Village Hall is reopening soon with the possibility of clubs restarting.

There were no concerns raised about the helpline reducing to 3 hours weekdays, 9am to 12pm.

A Parish Councillor felt that having two clerks had been an advantage over lockdown and it was good to see everyone pulling together. Communication may have been dealt with better.

It was agreed that there would be an update to be published in the Lakenheath Times to include a reminder to remain sensible.

#### 7.7.20

Cllr Colin Noble for Suffolk County Council announced work dates for Farthing Drove which has been closed since early March due to a collapsed Culvert:

Really good news today that as we get back to some sort of 'new' normal, after months of lobbying I've been told by Suffolk's Highways team that UK Power Networks have agreed to prioritise Farthings Drove power line temporary moving, as they come out of network repairs only mode and return to planned works.

To those who live and work in my area this is extremely welcome news and will mean a lot as it will allow the highways team to then work safety to repair a collapsed drain that could not be worked on with live power lines directly overhead.

The collapsed drain could not have come at a worse time as Covid-19 meant that UK Power Networks only undertook work to keep the grid working rather than planning works. The diversion for many residents has been a difficult one at this already difficult time.

UKPN will be attending next month to divert the overhead power cables which are in close proximity of the culvert collapse into a nearby field, this will then enable our contractors to safely repair the damaged culvert.

UKPN has programmed in to erect the temporary power poles from Thursday 27 August, with the aim of having this completed by Friday 4 September. Not as fast as we would all hope but at least we have got UKPN to programme the works in.

Suffolk Highways contractors will then be able to start works to repair the collapse from Monday 7 September. They estimate that the works to rebuild the culvert and the bank, including resurfacing of the above section of road will take approximately six weeks.

UKPN will then return to reinstate the main power lines with the aim of reopening the road by the end of October 2020.

#### 8.7.2020

Chancellor Rishi Sunak's Summer Statement confirmed a stamp duty holiday, jobs for under 24s, eating out vouchers and a VAT cut have all been announced.

#### **9.7.20**20

USAF 48<sup>th</sup> Fighter Wing – Base Commander posted this statement:

Today I completed my last full day as Commander of the Liberty Wing.

Words cannot express what a great honour it has been to lead this team for the last two years. Heather and I have greatly appreciated the tremendous partnership the Wing enjoy, not only with our teammates at team Mildenhall, but with the local community and civic leaders. We will leave with many new friends that we will cherish for our lifetimes and with a special place in our hearts for the people-both US and UK that enable the mission of securing our freedom and the sovereign skies. Tomorrow I will reluctantly relinquish command to my friend Col Jason "Vasco" Camilletti, and I know that team Camilletti will take the Wing to even greater heights. #### 17.7.2020

Today Mikel Blaine John Radford of Undley Common, Lakenheath appeared at Ipswich Magistrates Court. He answered the charge that he drove on a road in Newmarket with an invalid licence. Fined £100, victim surcharge £80, costs of £68 and had his licence endorsed. He also drove on a road in Newmarket without insurance. Fined £200 and had his licence endorsed. "The ramp consolidates F-15E Strike Eagle operations for the two squadrons, shortens transit times and maintenance operations, and saves manpower while improving mission efficiency," said Lt. Col. Clinton G. Warner, director of the 48th F-35 Program Integration Office at RAF Lakenheath.

The expansion project began in April of 2019 and was completed August 2020 to facilitate construction of the parking apron for the incoming F-35A Lightning II aircraft arriving in late 2021.

"This represents a huge milestone for the F-35 program at RAF Lakenheath and also for U.K. defences," said Mark Evans, the F-35 Delivery Partner project manager for the DIO. "It represents the successful completion of collaborations between multiple industry organisations of the U.K. and U.S. visiting forces."

The arrival of the F-35A will mark the first-ever permanent basing of U.S. fifth-generation aircraft in the European theatre, enhancing the 48th Fighter Wing's combat lethality and contributions to the collective defence of the NATO alliance.

#### 22.9.2020

The Government announced that after a period of some stabilisation, we're now seeing the number of COVID-19 cases beginning to rise across the country. I have set out the new rules due to the severity of the changes and ensure that it is written into our village history.

Following the latest announcements from the government today, this is an update on the latest COVID-19 guidance, as this situation rapidly unfolds.

The government has confirmed that the UK is now at a 'tipping point' and has introduced some new restrictions in an attempt to control the spread of COVID-19. This includes the limiting of gatherings to no more than six people and the closing of pubs and restaurants at 10pm. Please be aware that the rules and measures differ slightly between England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland, as well as in areas that are currently experiencing local lockdowns, so please familiarise yourself with the rules in your area.

#### Working from home

The government confirmed today that they are now recommending that people work from home if they can. We appreciate that this isn't an option for our frontline workforce, who are working tirelessly day in, day out, to keep our country running. However, we are now recommending that Mitie colleagues who would ordinarily work from a Mitie office but can work from home, should do so. Although our offices will remain open for now, we ask that you don't work from the office unless it's absolutely essential for the performance of your job. Please discuss with your line manager if you're unsure whether or not you need to be in the office.

#### When to self-isolate and what to do

In the event that you or someone you know develops COVID-19 symptoms, you can find all of the government guidance on when to self-isolate.

If a colleague tests positive for COVID-19, they must self-isolate for 10 days. If a colleague has come into contact with someone who has tested positive, they may need to self-isolate for 14 days, however they will be contacted by NHS Test and Trace, who will confirm this.

The government has just announced a new £500 Isolation Support Payment for low-income employees that meet all the following criteria:

They are currently receiving benefits, which could be Universal Credit, Working Tax Credit, income-based Employment and Support Allowance, income-based Jobseeker's Allowance, Income Support, Housing Benefit and/or Pension Credit;

They are in work, either employed or self-employed;

They can't work from home and will lose income as a result; and

They've been told to self-isolate by NHS Test and Trace, either for 10 days after testing positive or for 14 days as a result of a close contact with someone who has tested positive.

The scheme will come into effect from Monday, 28 September and will be administered through local authorities online or by phone (not through employers). At this stage, the scheme has only been announced for England, but we understand similar schemes will be in place for Scotland, Wales and NI. We'll provide more details as and when they become available.

#### The Prime Minister said:

"The best way we can fight this virus is by everyone following the rules and self-isolating if they're at risk of passing on coronavirus. And so nobody underestimates just how important this is, new regulations will mean you are legally obliged to do so if you have the virus or have been asked to do so by NHS Test and Trace.

People who choose to ignore the rules will face significant fines. We need to do all we can to control the spread of this virus, to prevent the most vulnerable people from becoming infected, and to protect the NHS and save lives.

And while most people are doing their absolute level best to comply with the rules, I don't want to see a situation where people don't feel they are financially able to self-isolate.

That's why we're also introducing a new £500 Test and Trace Support payment for those on low incomes who are required by NHS Test and Trace to remain at home to help stop the spread of the virus."

Suffolk Today publication reported that: The 48th Fighter Wing, based at RAF Lakenheath, have completed a planned three day readiness exercise.

Mission Assurance Exercise (MAX) 20-20 is an exercise designed to develop capabilities for conducting operations from forward operating bases with varying levels of capacity and support, ensuring airmen and aircrews are ready to deliver lethal combat power at any time and from anywhere.

Col. Jason Camilletti, Commander of the 48th Fighter Wing, said: "Establishing and sustaining small expeditionary bases is part of our Airman DNA.

"Agile Combat Employment (ACE) enables airmen to utilise flexibility and ingenuity to defeat the enemy in austere conditions."

The 48th Fighter Wing trains with allies and partners during these ACE events to enable forces to counter military aggression while allowing airmen an opportunity to gain hands on experience.

Staff Sergeant Brian Nguyen, dedicated crew chief for the 748th Aircraft Maintenance Squadron, added: "I think hands-on experience is the best way for my Airmen to see how they impact the mission.

"It allows them to see ACE concepts in action, and also the perspective of other agencies around base."

The exercise took place across three air bases at RAF Lakenheath and RAF Mildenhall in Suffolk as well as RAF Conningsby in Lincolnshire.

MAX 20-20 is vital in maintaining the 48th Fighter Wing's operational competence away from their home station, its effective combat readiness capabilities, and its continued ability to ensure air superiority for NATO partners and allied nations.

Group Captain Matt Peterson, RAF Coningsby Station Commander, said: "The US Air Force and Royal Air Force have worked successfully together over a long period of time.

These new measures have been carefully judged to achieve the maximum reduction in growth in the number of cases, preventing the NHS from being overwhelmed, whilst ensuring that schools, colleges and universities stay open and that as many people as possible continue to work.

Until Thursday 5 November, the relevant Local Covid Alert Level measures will continue to apply in the area where you live. From Thursday the national restrictions replace the local restrictions in your area. No new areas will move in the LCAL Very High restrictions between now and Thursday.

The new measures will apply nationally for four weeks up to Wednesday 2 December. At the end of the period, we will look to return to a regional approach, based on the latest data.

Complying with the new measures will help limit the spread of coronavirus, reduce the impact on the NHS and save lives. They will be underpinned by law which will make clear about what you must and must not do from 5 November. The relevant authorities, including the police, will have powers to enforce the law – including through fines and dispersing gatherings.

Protect your loved ones.

#### 1. Stay at home

This means you must not leave or be outside of your home except for specific purposes. These include:

for childcare or education, where this is not provided online

for work purposes, where your place of work remains open and where you cannot work from home (including if your job involves working in other people's homes)

to exercise outdoors or visit an outdoor public place - with the people you live with, with your support bubble or, when on your own, with 1 person from another household (children under school age, as well as those dependent on round-the-clock care, such as those with severe disabilities, who are with their parents will not count towards the limit on two people meeting outside).

for any medical concerns, reasons, appointments and emergencies, or to avoid or escape risk of injury or harm - such as domestic abuse

shopping for basic necessities, for example food and medicine, which should be as infrequent as possible

to visit members of your support bubble or provide care for vulnerable people, or as a volunteer This list is not exhaustive and there are other limited circumstances where you may be permitted to leave or be outside of your home. These will be set out in law and further detailed guidance will be provided.

#### 2. Staying safe outside the home (Social Distancing)

You should minimise time spent outside your home and when around other people ensure that you are two metres apart from anyone not in your household or support bubble.

Remember - 'Hands. Face. Space':

hands – wash your hands regularly and for 20 seconds

face – wear a face covering in indoor settings where social distancing may be difficult, and where you will come into contact with people you do not normally meet

space – stay 2 metres apart from people you do not live with where possible, or 1 metre with extra precautions in place (such as wearing face coverings or increasing ventilation indoors)

3. Meeting with family and friends

You must not meet socially indoors with family or friends unless they are part of your household - meaning the people you live with - or support bubble.

A support bubble is where a household with one adult joins with another household. Households in that support bubble can still visit each other, stay overnight, and visit outdoor public places together.

You can exercise or visit outdoor public places with the people you live with, your support bubble, or 1 person from another household (children under school age, as well as those dependent on round-

the-clock care, such as those with severe disabilities, who are with their parents will not count towards the limit on two people meeting outside).

Outdoor public places include:

parks, beaches, countryside, public gardens (whether or not you pay to enter them), allotments playgrounds
You cannot meet in a private garden.

#### 4. Businesses and venues

To reduce social contact, the Government has ordered certain businesses and venues to close. These include:

all non-essential retail, including, but not limited to clothing and electronics stores, vehicle showrooms, travel agents, betting shops, auction houses, tailors, car washes, tobacco and vape shops.

indoor and outdoor leisure facilities such as bowling alleys, leisure centres and gyms, sports facilities including swimming pools, golf courses and driving ranges, dance studios, stables and riding centres, soft play facilities, climbing walls and climbing centres, archery and shooting ranges, water and theme parks,

entertainment venues such as theatres, concert halls, cinemas, museums and galleries, casinos, adult gaming centres and arcades, bingo halls, bowling alleys, concert halls, zoos and other animal attractions, botanical gardens;

personal care facilities such as hair, beauty and nail salons, tattoo parlours, spas, massage parlours, body and skin piercing services, non-medical acupuncture, and tanning salons.

Food shops, supermarkets, garden centres and certain other retailers providing essential goods and services can remain open. Essential retail should follow COVID-secure guidelines to protect customers, visitors and workers.

Non-essential retail can remain open for delivery to customers and click-and-collect.

Playgrounds can remain open.

Hospitality venues like restaurants, bars and pubs must close, but can still provide takeaway and delivery services. However, takeaway of alcohol will not be allowed.

Hotels, hostels and other accommodation should only open for those who have to travel for work purposes and for a limited number of other exemptions which will be set out in law.

A full list of the business closures will be published and set out in law.

Some venues will be allowed to remain open for specific exempt activities, like childcare and support groups. Support groups that are essential to deliver in person can continue with up to 15 participants where formally organised to provide mutual aid, therapy or any other form of support. This includes support to victims of crime, people in drug and alcohol recovery, new parents and guardians, people with long-term illnesses, people facing issues relating to their sexuality or gender, and those who have suffered bereavement.

A number of public services will also stay open and you will be able to leave home to visit them. These include:

the NHS and medical services like GPs. We are supporting the NHS to safely carry out urgent and non-urgent services and it is vital anyone who thinks they need any kind of medical care comes forward and seeks help.

Courts

**Civil Registrations Offices** 

5. Weddings, civil partnerships, religious services and funerals

Funerals can be attended by a maximum of 30 people, and it is advised that only close friends and family attend. Linked ceremonial events such as stone settings and ash scatterings can also continue with up to 15 people in attendance. Anyone working is not included. Social distancing should be maintained between people who do not live together or share a support bubble.

Weddings, civil partnership ceremonies will not be permitted to take place except in exceptional circumstances.

Places of Worship will be closed, unless they are being used for:

**Funerals** 

To broadcast acts of worship

Individual prayer

Formal childcare or where part of a school

Essential voluntary and public services, such as blood donation or food banks

Other exempted activities such as some support groups

6. Going to work

To help contain the virus, everyone who can work effectively from home must do so. Where people cannot do so (for instance people who work in critical national infrastructure, construction or manufacturing) they should continue to travel to work/attend their workplace. This is essential to keeping the country operating and supporting vital sectors and employers.

Public sector employees working in essential services, including education settings, should continue to go into work. The risk of transmission can be substantially reduced if COVID-secure guidelines are followed closely. Extra consideration should be given to those people at higher risk.

#### 7. Going to school, college and university

The Government will continue to prioritise the wellbeing and long-term futures of our young people and will not be closing schools, colleges or universities. It remains very important for children and young people to attend, to support their wellbeing and education and help working parents and guardians. Senior clinicians still advise that school is the best place for children to be, and so they should continue to go to school. Schools have implemented a range of protective measures to make them safe.

The Prime Minister and Education Secretary have been clear that exams will go ahead next summer, as they are the fairest and most accurate way to measure a pupil's attainment. We therefore need to keep schools and colleges open so that children are able to keep progressing towards exams and the next stage of education or employment. Students now have more time to prepare for their exams next year, as most AS, A levels and GCSEs will be held 3 weeks later to help address the disruption caused by the pandemic.

Universities have welcomed students back and we have published guidance advising universities on reopening to ensure they have safety measures in place to minimise the spread of the virus.

Universities and adult education settings should consider moving to increased levels of online learning where possible.

There are further restrictions in place:

If you live at university, you must not move back and forward between your permanent home and student home during term time. You should only return home at the end of term for Christmas. We will publish further guidance on the end of term.

#### 8. Childcare and children's activities

Parents will still be able to access some registered childcare and other childcare activities (including wraparound care) where reasonably necessary to enable parents to work, or for the purposes of respite care.

Early years settings can remain open. Parents are able to form a childcare bubble with another household for the purposes of informal childcare, where the child is 13 or under. As above, some households will also be able to benefit from being in a support bubble, which allows single adult households to join another household.

Some youth services may be able to continue, such as 1-1 youth work and support groups, but most youth clubs and groups will need to cease for this period.

#### 9. Protecting people more at risk from coronavirus

If you are over 60 or clinically vulnerable, you could be at higher risk of severe illness from coronavirus. You:

should be especially careful to follow the rules and minimise your contacts with others

should continue to wash your hands carefully and more frequently than usual and maintain thorough cleaning of frequently touched areas in your home and/or workspace

Clinically vulnerable people are those who are:

aged 70 or over (regardless of medical conditions)

under 70 with an underlying health condition listed below (that is, anyone instructed to get a flu jab each year on medical grounds):

chronic (long-term) mild to moderate respiratory diseases, such as asthma, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), emphysema or bronchitis

chronic heart disease, such as heart failure

chronic kidney disease

chronic liver disease, such as hepatitis

chronic neurological conditions, such as Parkinson's disease, motor neurone disease, multiple sclerosis (MS) or cerebral palsy

diabetes

a weakened immune system as the result of certain conditions or medicines they are taking (such as steroid tablets)

being seriously overweight (a body mass index (BMI) of 40 or above) pregnant

There is a further group of people who are defined, also on medical grounds, as clinically extremely vulnerable to coronavirus – that is, people with specific serious health conditions. Over this period, we are advising the CEV to work from home. If you cannot work from home, you are advised not to

go to work and may be eligible for Statutory Sick Pay (SSP) or Employment Support Allowance (ESA). You are encouraged to stay at home as much as possible, but are encouraged to go outside for exercise. The full new guidance will be published on Monday 2 November and the Government will write to everybody who is clinically extremely vulnerable to set out detailed advice while the new restrictions are in place. Current advice is in place at each local COVID alert level.

# 10. Visiting relatives in care homes

Guidance on care home visits will be published ahead of Thursday. For now, you should follow existing guidance

## 11. Travel

You should avoid travelling in or out of your local area, and you should look to reduce the number of journeys you make. However, you can and should still travel for a number of reasons, including:

travelling to work where this cannot be done from home

travelling to education and for caring responsibilities

hospital GP and other medical appointments or visits where you have had an accident or are concerned about your health

visiting venues that are open, including essential retail

exercise, if you need to make a short journey to do so

If you need to travel, we encourage you to walk or cycle where possible, and to plan ahead and avoid busy times and routes on public transport. This will allow you to practise social distancing while you travel.

Overnight stays and holidays away from primary residences will not be allowed. This includes holidays abroad and in the UK. It also means you cannot stay in a second home, if you own one, or staying with anyone you do not live with or are in a support bubble with. There are specific exceptions, for example if you need to stay away from home (including in a second home) for work purposes, but this means people cannot travel overseas or within the UK, unless for work, education or other legally permitted reasons.

You must not travel if you are experiencing any coronavirus symptoms, are self-isolating as a result of coronavirus symptoms, are sharing a household or support bubble with somebody with symptoms, or have been told to self-isolate after being contacted by NHS Test and Trace.

If you need to use public transport - to travel to work for example - you should follow the safer travel guidance. This includes the rules on wearing face masks and advice on car sharing.

For those planning to travel into England, you should check the current travel corridor list to see whether you need to isolate for 14 days. You will still be required to abide by the restrictions set out here even if you do not need to isolate. If you do need to travel overseas from England before 2 December (and are legally permitted to do so, for example, because it is for work), even if you are returning to a place, you've visited before, you should look at the rules in place at your destination, the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO) travel advice.

British nationals currently abroad do not need to return home immediately. However, you should check with your airline or travel operator on arrangements for returning.

#### 12. Financial support

Workers in any part of the UK can retain their job, even if their employer cannot afford to pay them, and be paid at least 80% of their salary up to £2500 a month.

The flexibility of the current CJRS will be retained to allow employees to continue to work where they can.

Employers small or large, charitable or non-profit are eligible and because more businesses will need to close, they will now be asked to pay just National Insurance and Pensions contributions for their staff during the month of November – making this more generous than support currently on offer.

The Job Support Scheme will not be introduced until after Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme ends Wherever you live, you may be able to get financial help through the:

Representing your community on the County Council is an honour and a privilege. No more so than when you are helping residents with their issues and concerns. It's a working role rather than a ceremonial one. Still, on Remembrance Sunday, it's usually both, with the laying of wreaths and chatting to the resident before and after the ceremonies.

I say Remembrance Sunday but in my case it really a remembrance weekend as there are several war memorials in villages across the Row Heath division area and acts of Remembrance take place across the weekend. Indeed one village holds its remembrance ceremony always on the eleventh day at the eleventh hour to make when the First World War ended, so this year that's on Wednesday coming.

The biggest gathering is usually Lakenheath where groups from across our community Scouts, Cubs, Girl Guides and Brownies along with Children from the village primary school all march through the village and after the laying of wreaths we all go to our village church for a rousing service of remembrance. Sadly this year, just a few of us, socially distanced, gathered to remember and mark

the occasion. And like so many things this year, many children missed out on this moment spending time to understand our history and the consequence of war.

The lockdown whilst protecting all of us and making sure the NHS can cope with those who do get ill still means we have not been able to pay our collective respects as we would want to. But it's important for our family, friends, work colleagues and communities that we beat this thing together and that why this year we quietly marked the occasion. Next year when we have a vaccine is available, and the danger is passed we can all contribute to the 100th anniversary of the Royal British Legion and pay our respects properly to those who make the ultimate sacrifice. ## 24.11.2020

The Prime Minister announces up to three households will be able to meet up during a five-day Christmas period of 23 to 27 December. Other rules were reinforced. Lakenheath is in tier 1 the lowest tier. In short this allowed:

- 1. The rule of 6 applies indoors and outdoors
- 2. Pubs, bars and Restaurants can open but to table service only.
- 3. Shops non-essential retail can re-open
- 4. Hair and beauty salons can open
- 5. Work from home if it is possible to do so
- 6. Overnight stays yes so long as it is within your support bubble.
- 7. Travel walk or cycle if possible. Avoid travel into tier 3 areas except where necessary ie work, education, medical attention or caring responsibilities
- 8. Hotels can open
- 9. Education nurseries schools colleges universities can all open

- 10. Religious services. Places of worship will open but people must abide by the rule of 6
- 11. Weddings and funerals no more than 15 guests at weddings, wedding receptions and wakes; 30 for funerals
- 12. Amateur sport classes and organised adult sport can take place outdoors but must follow rule of six indoors.
- 13. Gyms and Pools can open
- 14. Professional Sport Spectators limited to 50 per cent capacity or 4000 outdoors and 1000 indoors
- 15. Live Performances Audience limited to 50 per cent or 4000 outdoors and 1000 indoors

No mixing of households indoors aside from support bubbles will be allowed, with a maximum gathering of six permitted outdoors.

Pubs and bars will remain closed unless operating as restaurants, with alcohol only served as part of a "substantial meal" until 10pm, before venues must close at 11pm.

All retail, leisure and personal care services are able to reopen.

People will be encouraged to reduce the number of journeys they make and to avoid travelling into Tier 3 areas, except for reasons of education or work.

Overnight stays will only be permitted for those in the same household or support bubble and accommodation can open.

Places of worship can reopen, but people must not interact with anyone outside their household or support bubble.

Fifteen guests will be allowed at weddings and civil partnerships, increasing to 30 for funerals. Classes and organised sport can take place outdoors but not indoors if there is any interaction between two different households.

Large events including sport and live performances will be open to the public but limited to 50% capacity or 2,000 outdoors and 1,000 indoors.

# 19.12.2020

Boris Johnson, the Prime Minister, has announced further restrictions as the rate of Covid-19 infections is rising rapidly as a new strain emerges. The planned relaxation of coronavirus rules for a five-day period over Christmas has been cut to just Christmas Day for people living in Tiers 1 to 3, which includes Suffolk in Tier 2. Prime Minister Boris Johnson has announced. As Suffolk remains

in Tier 2, they will also see the Christmas "bubble" policy – allowing up to three households to meet up over the holiday period – severely curtailed, applying on Christmas Day only when previously it was to cover 5 days of Christmas.

The recommendation is still to work from home if you are able to.

# End of year report received from the RSPB

# 2020- a year of 'ups' and 'downs' at RSPB Lakenheath Fen

2020 was a very different year- when word got round our office in March that there was a new virus around which was very contagious... we hoped and prayed that it wouldn't affect us. But what a rollercoaster ride it took us on which has not ended yet despite it being ten months later. In early April, I and a couple of my colleagues were furloughed, to return in June, reunited with the rest of the team and together we attempted to put the pieces of the reserve back together- none of the paths had been mown so vegetation was several feet high everywhere, and we had marsh harriers nesting very close to a path, which we cordoned off to give them peace and privacy. A few weeks later, this nest produced five beautiful fledglings, which was a wonderful reward for protecting their awkwardly-placed nest! Joining them in the avian creche of summer 2020 was one crane chick, hatched and nurtured by one of two pairs of cranes using the reserve in 2020- 'pair A2'. We had a second pair of new (and possibly inexperienced) birds who attempted to breed but failed- we are hoping they will try again this Spring.

It was heart-warming to see the wildlife going about its business throughout the pandemic-displaying, breeding and raising young, no matter what struggles we humans may be having ourselves. As I write this in January 2021, we have just entered a third lockdown, but the reserve is full to bursting with redwing, fieldfare, roe deer, woodpeckers, marsh harriers and even a scarce hen harrier- delightful to those local visitors still able to reach us for their daily exercise. In 2020 we finished the year with:

- 139 bird species recorded from the reserve, including white stork, bar-headed goose and wood sandpiper.
- 15 dragonfly and damselfly species.
- 19 different butterflies, including a white-letter hairstreak, a purple hairstreak and a clouded yellow.
- 19 mammals recorded, including a pair of Chinese water deer!

What's next for us at the reserve

Looking ahead to the future, we have plans to improve the reserve further this year, such as placing colour-coded way marker posts at path junctions throughout the reserve to co-ordinate with our four trails- purple, green, orange and yellow- to make it easier for visitors to find their way around. This work is being generously funded by a local conservation grant for which we are very grateful. We also plan to replace the bird feeding station at the front of the Visitor Centre- which is falling apart- with a new-look station, perhaps in the form of a couple of tree branches decorated with feeders! The only event we managed to hold in 2020 was our usual long-distance winter-themed guided walk of 6 miles, led by one of our fit and enthusiastic volunteers, down to the far western end of the reserve and back. It was on 1 February which enables the route to take in parts of the reserve closed off to the public during the breeding season as the cranes make this end their dominion and are very sensitive to disturbance. This year, we hope to resume events in summer with plenty of guided walks, organised moth traps and children's activities. We are planning for a positive outcome in summer and we will just hope for the best!
