The January edition of Lakenheath Times, filled mainly with adverts, informed the community that the current editors of the monthly magazine are to retire. February edition will be the last till a new editor is located with their own arrangements as to news and advertising.

The next litter pick round the village will take place 4.2.2023 which it is intended will mainly cover hedge rows.

#### 8.1.2023

Today is Plough Sunday, a traditional celebration of the beginning of the agricultural year. The observance of Plough Sunday on the First Sunday of Epiphany goes back to Victorian times, but there is a much older observance, associated with the first working day after the twelve days of Christmas, hence 'Plough Monday' in some places. In the Middle Ages ploughs were sometimes kept in the parish church, and some churches kept a 'plough-light' – a candle that burned over the plough throughout the winter

#### 20.1.2023

Today, Covey Way in Lakenheath has seen its street sign replaced, spelt incorrectly, with the letter 'n' added unnecessarily between the 'o' and the 'v'.



#### 22.1.2023

Wendy Clare Barnes announced that she hoped that everyone enjoyed the December Christmas Stocking event, we are very thankful to everyone that donated.

Plans are now underway for the Village Easter Egg hunt which will be on Sat 8th April and a FREE event again this year! Last year almost 100 eggs were given out.

A request for donations of eggs was made with thanks for supporting the initiative.

#### 24.1.2023

Today the Covey Way Street sign was fixed after a bungle in Lakenheath when it was earlier supplied incorrectly spelt.

#### 25.1.2023

It was today announced that thousands of households in Suffolk will get a share of cold weather payments after the county was battered by sub-zero temperatures. This included Lakenheath for eligible Residents. Those eligible will receive the payment for each seven-day period of very cold weather and the scheme runs until March 31.

People who may be eligible for cold weather payments are those who get pension credit, income support, income-based jobseeker's allowance, income-related employment, support allowance or universal credit and support for mortgage interest.

People do not need to claim - if you are eligible for the payment the money will be paid automatically.

Cold weather payments are not the same as winter fuel payments - which eligible people get towards their heating bills.

#### 29.1.2023

Today, three people were arrested after police stopped a car in Lakenheath. The vehicle was spotted on the B1112 in the early hours of Sunday morning.

According to Norfolk and Suffolk Roads and Armed Policing Team, the "high performance car" was being driven at about 1am when it raised suspicion.

The force wrote on Twitter: "Three up, high performance car, miles from where you live and going for a test drive apparently? "At 1am in the morning? "Vehicle searched and various items related to vehicle theft and burglary found." Police confirmed that three people had been arrested and the vehicle seized.

#### 31.1.2023

Today the village found that the road between Lords Walk and Eriswell was blocked and closed to traffic this morning.

At Lunchtime Suffolk County Council put out the following: The Network Inspector has been to site this morning and Anglian Water had set up an emergency road closure for repairs to a leaking communication pipe. The works were discussed on site between Anglian Water and the Network Inspector and it was determined that these works do not warrant an emergency closure as there is no immediate risk, or danger to the public and properties in the area. The inspector has asked that the closure is removed from site as soon as possible. These works will be replanned in, and it has been agreed that two-way signals will be used instead of a road closure to avoid major disruption to the area.

Road Closed signs were still in place late afternoon causing chaos to surrounding areas as people took diversionary routes. This was not helped by the Level crossing at Brandon being stuck in the closed position making Wangford Road very busy.

- 2. This is the last edition of the Monthly Lakenheath Times. The magazine will continue but will become quarterly with the first copy being a Spring edition.


#### 2.2.2023

#### 24.2.2023

Today the Men's Shed Breakfast group announced a meeting on Saturday 4<sup>th</sup> March 2023, at 8.30 am till 10 am at the Lakenheath Peace Memorial Hall. This is a new initiative for older chaps in the village to get together for a breakfast, read the papers and have a chat. Its free so men are encouraged to attend.

Today Lakenheath Youth Football Club announced that this year's FA Accreditation has been completed and 2 stars were awarded to the club.



Today, Parish Councillors, Hasting, Gyte and Morley, visited Graeme Cook, the oldest Lakenheath Resident. Graeme Cook was awarded the Freedom of the village for services rendered.

Parish Councillor Ed Morley presented the Freedom award to Mr Cook, saying:

"I am here today to present the parish of Lakenheath's highest honour; that of the Freedom of Lakenheath.

It is my great hour to have received the very first award last year. I have known you since I was a small boy and I have seen you at Fetes/ Amdrams, L.A.D.s and as a hardworking member of Lakenheath life, and my milkman! outstanding!

I wish you a very happy upcoming birthday and my respect and best wishes to you – I gladly hand you your award, sir. A life well lived!"

Born on 19th March 1918 at Oulton Broad Lowestoft Suffolk. He arrived in Lakenheath with his parents and his two siblings Stanley and Gwenda, in 1923 and lived in Undley Hall, which had been bought by West Suffolk Council and split into small holdings.

In 1926, when he was about seven years old, he was sent to Liverpool to live with his aunt and uncle, as it was thought at the time that this might improve his future, but he returned to Lakenheath for holidays. He was enrolled in a school in Allerton.

Saturdays were very special as he was given four old pennies and was able to go to the Garston Empire cinema. He stayed eighteen months in Liverpool and in 1928 he returned home to Lakenheath.

During this time, he helped his father, after school, with the dairy herd and the small holding and with the harvest during summer holidays. In1931 the family moved into Lakenheath village to a small cottage in Broom Road where his father rented pasture with grazing facilities. In 1932 on leaving school at fourteen he got a part time job as an apprentice to the local butcher. At the age of sixteen he went to Cambridge and then St. Albans to continue his apprenticeship with Sainsburys.

In 1945 after ten years away, five of them as a butcher manager, and five in the AFS during the war, he returned to Lakenheath to take over the management of his father's business. He was hoping to create a pedigree Friesian herd, but circumstances made this impossible so he decided to buy milk wholesale already bottled. Thus, began Cook's Dairy Milk Round.

The same year he met his wife Joyce, who was from London, but serving in the Land Army in Lakenheath. They married in 1947 and lived in Broom Road, where their three children were born. The business moved to 63 High Street in 1967 and became Cook's Dairy from where it operated until it was sold in 1980 and Graeme and Joyce moved to a bungalow in Woodlands. Graeme continued to work as a butcher, first at the Co-op, and later with Yallops butchers until he retired at the age of eighty.

Over the years he immersed himself in the placed he loved, Lakenheath and the Community. He and Joyce joined Lakenheath Amateur Dramatic Society, he served as Chairman of the Village Hall committee, he belonged to the bowls club, the Rotary Club and served on Lakenheath Parish Council for many years. He was a regular church goer and worshipped at the Methodist Church until he was 102 years old when all outings were cancelled due to Covid.

Over the years Graeme organised many annual village carnivals and could been see riding a horse at the front of the parade, leading the floats through the village, dressed differently every year. He was always involved in Lakenheath life be it as the dame in the annual pantomime, old time musicals, talent shows, dances, jumble sales and singing to the residents of Lakenheath Village Home.

Graeme will reach the wonderful age of 105 on the 19th March and continues to be as cheeky as ever. He remains full of memories of his life in the place he chose to make his future with his wife of 72 years, three children and their partners, six grandchildren and nine great grandchildren (with another on the way).

Graeme said in his own words that he 'created an affection and loyalty that was attributed to the happy environment in Lakenheath when he first arrived at the age of 5, which over the years evoked a desire for him to make a future life in Lakenheath.'

Graeme also received chocolates, a bottle of champagne and a bunch of flowers from the Parish Council as he approaches his 105th birthday.





Today, Lakenheath Library announced this year as well as providing an exciting back drop for your World Book Day photos they are offering a sweet treat to everyone borrowing a book using their own library card on Thursday 2nd March. This is an encouragement to increase reading particularly for the Primary School Children.

February rainfall was only 6 mm.

The new format Lakenheath Times, Spring Edition has arrived. It is now an A5 book like magazine. It still includes details of the main groups within Lakenheath. Lots of advertising of various trades in the form of a list as well as their separate adverts. (This pays in the main for the magazine to be distributed to all homes in the village). It informs the community that

Chair of the Lakenheath Parish Council announced that the new format for the
magazine was because of the Neighbourhood Planning survey which made it
clear it was important to have the paper. This will now contain more details
and is in colour. It is hoped that the clubs and Societies within the village will
contribute articles. It is smaller and brighter and set out in clear sections.

- Lakenheath Village, along with the rest of the country, will celebrate the Coronation of King Charles III on Saturday 6<sup>th</sup> May, 8 months after his Majesty's accession to the throne, after the passing of his mother 8 September 2022. This can be watched live on a TV.
- On the Sunday Residents are invited to the Big Lunch. The Parish Council
  invites you to bring along a picnic lunch to Lakenheath Pavilion on the playing
  fields from 1 pm to 4 pm. The Licenced bar will be open for teas, coffees, and
  soft drinks. There will be a bouncy castle and face painting.
- On Monday the Big Help Out Day! This will be held at Lakenheath Peace Memorial Hall and Community centre. The aim of the day is to highlight the positive impact volunteering and joining in has on communities. The Parish Council are organising a community event where all clubs/organisations and sports clubs are invited to set up a stand to show what is on offer in the village, and encourage people to join, either as volunteers or members. Lakenheath Peace Memorial Hall and the Community Centre are hosting this event from 10 am to 4 pm. It can then be seen what a busy and active community we have in Lakenheath. The Licenced bar will be open and teas, coffees and cakes will be available.
- Monday May 8 will be a second spring bank holiday granted by the Prime Minister Rishi Sunak who said it would allow people to come together and celebrate just as communities did more recently for the Queens Platinum Jubilee celebrations in June last year.
- Thursday 4<sup>th</sup> May it is polling day for the local District Council Elections,
- Lakenheath Casuals, Est. 1971 gave a short history of their Club. For 40 years the Club played in the Thetford Sunday league and most players in those days who played in the team also played for Lakenheath FC on a Saturday. However, in 2013 the team evolved and moved into the Cambridgeshire Saturday League playing at the Lakenheath Pavilion. With a multitude of local Lakenheath people over the years helping out running the Club but unfortunately the 1st Team and the Reserves folded in 2016. Until 2018 when an ex-player decided to resurrect the club and bring it back to life. His purpose was to build a team with local players to see where he could get the Club to. Cambridgeshire County leagues refused them league entry so they decided to enter the Central and South Norfolk League as a Suffolk based team. Lakenheath Casuals grew from strength to strength being promoted every year adding a second Senior Men's team, Vets Team, and a Ladies Team. Achieving FA Charter Standard Accreditation and UEFA C Coaching the Club today is thriving, with over 90 players signed on for the past 3 years we feel the Club has achieved its goal. We are aiming to improve our facilities by adding dugouts and floodlighting in the future and Casuals 1st Team are also looking to be promoted into the Anglian Combination League for the next seasons Campaign. All local support is welcomed. All teams play at Lakenheath Pavilion on the main Full-size pitch. Men's teams play Saturdays at 2 pm in the winter and 3 pm in the Summer. Lakenheath Ladies play on Sundays 2 pm in the winter and 3 pm in the summer.

- Greener Lakenheath. Cllr. Judy Cahill leads on environmental issues for the Parish. To date she works hard to improve our environment. Following the Neighbourhood Plan survey, it was clear that we all want a cleaner, greener Lakenheath so several projects got under way. The first, Mutford Green area, where there was planted native trees and hedging which will eventually hide the electricity sub-station; a memorial tree for the Queens Jubilee was planted. Lots of bulbs have also been planted and the planters near the road now look the part. Later in the year work will start to clear the brambles and the drainage ditch. A "green gateway" is to be created at each end of the village centre. Around the Lakenheath sign 3000 bulbs have been planted and wild flowers are to be sown to take over when the bulbs are finished flowering. More bulbs have been planted around the Dumpling Bridge Lane junction. Beds at the entrance to the Cemetery and around the Chapel have been cleared and replanted.
- Lakenheath in Bloom is a new volunteer group who are busy buying and installing tubs and benches around the centre of the village and by the surgery.
- 4 times a year there will be a litter pick around the village.

# Lakenheath FC

LFC Manager's Assistant, Alan Gyte, brings us up to date with the team's progress - and a look back at its history!

In the spring of 2018, the club appointed Ben Cowling as First Team Manager, and he has overseen a drastic overhaul of the club, both on and off the pitch. Having been fortunate to have been elected to Step 6 in the Eastern Counties League Division 1 North, we finished a creditable 5th. That season also saw the club make a significant investment in the club's facilities, including the addition of floodlights, new dugouts, and spectator hardstanding as the club achieved a 'G' ground grading from the FA.

Unfortunately, in the seasons 2019/20 and 2020/21 only a handful of games took place because of pandemic. The FA decided that on a points-per-game basis, we were promoted to the Thurlow Nunn Premier Division and Step 53 for the 2021/22 season for first time in the club's history. We finished in 12th place which was a fantastic achievement. We are of course looking to improve on last season and currently sit in 6th place.

The 'Heath was formed in the early 20th century, in the 1907/08 season. There's a bit of confusion about our original colours as there are a few 'original' shirts still around, including blue and gold stripes and black and gold quarters. Since those early days, we've changed colours a few times including green and yellow quarters, groon with white trim, blue and black stripes, yellow and now we are at back to our 60's colours, dark green with a white trim.

We have also had various home grounds too, including somewhere close to the playing fields and also to the right of the community centre, the old British Legion. We arrived at the Nest around the time of the 2nd World War. After the chalk was quarried for the construction of local roads,

the landowner, Sir Charlton Briscoe gave the quarry, also known as the Pit, to the village, on a long lease, to have a football pitch, and in the 1950's the current stand was built.

In the early 1960's, Sir Charlton sadly passed away and his son kindly offered the Pit to the football club for a 'very small fee' which was gladly accepted, and the place has grown since then.

We played in the early Ouse Valley League in the early years, and then the Essex and Suffolk Border League, winning the Suffolk Junior Cup in 1936/37, before becoming one of the founder members of the Anglian Combination League in the early 60's with our reserves playing in the Bury and District League.

In the late 1990's, the club joined the Cambs League where both teams played until 2017/18 and indeed our reserves are still in the Senior B League. Most of our success has come in the last 20 years, although our under 18 team won the Suffolk Minor Cup for the first and only time in 1970, and our first team won the Junior Cup again in 1974 and our reserves won back to back Suffolk Primary Cups in early 1990's.

The first team gained promotion to step 7 of the football pyramid in 2008/09 winning Cambs Senior A. For the next 9 years we finished in the top 3 of the Premier Division – 6 times winning the League in 2010/11 and winning the Cambs League Cup 3 times and the Suffolk Senior Cup in 2015 with a record 7-0 victory against Ipswich Valley Rangers in the final.

I believe we are one of only a handful of clubs that have won all county cups available to us, and are proud that we now qualify for the Premier Cup competition.

# **Good Neighbours and Good Neighbors**

When humankind was first exhorted to 'Love thy neighbour' it was not made in English or American but spoken by Jesus who was quoting Moses in Hebrew or Aramaic. It was written down some years after in Hebrew, Greek and Latin. And when William Tyndale printed the first English language bible around 1523 from Wycliffe's earlier translation in 1382 that wrote it out as neiybore, he printed it as Love thy Neighbor. It wasn't until the King James version, that used more than 70% of Wycliffe's Old English translation, that 'neighbor' became 'neighbour' and became the standard English spelling.

Now we have different spellings and different names in American English and British English for quite a few objects too with faucet for tap, crisps - chips, cookies – biscuits, closet – wardrobe and continuing the food theme, Sprinkles are becoming more familiar to those who still call them Hundreds and Thousands and menus in England have 'starters' more often than the customary appetizers! And in punctuating our written language, period means a full stop.

As for anticlockwise to counterclockwise – it may be a different expression of the direction speed skaters negotiate a track, short or long, but both terms describe a common heritage. Ice speed distance skating began on the fens of England in East Anglia and so did the 11 a side game of bandy, that was adapted when the first indoor small ice pads were built, on both sides of the Atlantic, to ice hockey and indoor aka short track speed skating.

The RAF Lakenheath USAF air base is a neighbor to Lakenheath village for whom it has been a neighbour for half a century.

As the Stars and Stripes fly outside many homes in the village, and the strains of both the American and United Kingdom National Anthems are heard being played at the base every day at the specified time for Retreat we can say these are good neighbors and good neighbours indeed.

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# Exciting Times in Spring at Lakenheath Fen

There is plenty to enjoy here at RSPB Lakenheath Fen in Spring. Writes RSPB officer Heidi Jones. As well as all the changes in wildlife, it is magical to watch the reserve become a brighter shade of green, to watch wildflowers appear and to listen to a wealth of birdsong. If you have a spare day, or even half a day, why not pop down and spend some time here? By the beginning of March, the first signs of Spring will be noticeable wherever you are- crocuses and daffodils flowering on roadside verges whilst small birds like robins and blackbirds pair up and sing in gardens. Whilst we don't have the Spring bulbs, we do have the birds and one of the first changes we notice is the increase in variety of wading birds on the Washland. Already (on 7 February) a few avocets have turned up and during March we can expect to see other species such as dunlin, ruff and black-tailed godwit in small numbers. These don't come to the reserve to breed but use us as a pitstop to refuel on their long migration to their breeding grounds. March, as a result, is a fantastic time to see some more unusual waders without having to travel far from home! April will also bring more migrant birds to us, including the swallow, house martin and cuckoo. It will also be the month when bitterns 'boom' their low, deep calls from within the reedbeds more frequently. Through March we may hear some booming but it really gets regular in April, especially on sunny, calm mornings. Other highlights to enjoy will be aerial displays from marsh harriers. Male birds

will be turning, twisting and diving in energetic displays over reedbeds, designed to show females how capable they are of chasing prey and of their general agility. You may also see 'food passes' from males to interested females. again to demonstrate a very important skill- that males are capable of catching and delivering plenty of food. April normally sees the first butterflies and dragonflies become airborne on fair days. Numbers of these larger insects quickly build up and together with the mass emergence of the clumsy, black (but harmless) St. Mark's flies, they will provide a feast for the hobbies arriving from Africa. These elegant falcons (with a conspicuous red patch of feathers around the base of the legs) look like miniature peregrines and numbers can rise to around 50 birds here by the end of May. At this point, the hobbies begin to disperse to their breeding grounds across the UK and our numbers drop to two or three pairs which stay to breed with us for the summer.



Lakenheath Football Club said that penalty shootouts are a time for heroes - so step forward Charlie Beckwith. The goalkeeper kept out four spot kicks - and one more during normal time - as Lakenheath made history by winning their first piece of silverware as a Step 5 club this afternoon.

Despite enjoying a positive campaign in the Thurlow Nunn League Premier Division with a fifth-place finish, Lakenheath were very much the underdogs going into today's League Challenge Cup final at Hadleigh United FC against champions Ipswich Wanderers.

But after playing out a 0-0 draw it was Ben Cowling's side that came out on top 7-6 in a remarkable shootout that went 10 rounds and was just one away from Beckwith having to take one himself.

Lakenheath looked the hungrier of the two teams during the first half. They won more first duels, were quicker to second balls and went closest to breaking the deadlock when Cameron Nicholls' cleanly hit effort from 25 yards out in the 20th minute cannoned against the base of the post, flashed across the face of goal, and went away to safety.

Up the other end Wanderers' only real significant effort of note saw Kris Rose head through a crowded area in the 31st minute, but Lakenheath skipper Sam Hawley was on hand to clear the danger.

The league winners stepped it up in the second half and had a good chance to go in front just two minutes after the restart when Jamie Eaton-Collins' low cross picked out Teon Leggett unmarked inside the box, but the forward with 22 goals to his name this term was unable to make a clean connection

Leggett was then thwarted by a strong left-handed save from Beckwith just after the hour mark and that battle was to become a running theme for much of what was left of the final.

In the 74th minute a frantic scramble inside the Lakenheath boss saw Eaton-Collins head against the crossbar from close range before his follow up effort was thwarted by Beckwith. The ball broke loose for Wanderers substitute Jack Madley but as he prepared to shoot he was felled by Ryan Taylor. Up stepped Leggett to take the resulting penalty, but Beckwith dived to his right to keep the ball out.

Within 60 seconds the Wanderers striker and Lakenheath goalkeeper faced off again as Leggett sprinted clear of the defence, yet with the angle narrowing Beckwith stood tall and made another stop.

By this point Wanderers were now controlling the possession but as the final whistle drew closer Lakenheath had a couple of decent openings. The first saw substitute Tom Debenham's left-footed strike kept out at the near post by Craig Brand, while in the sixth minute of stoppage time fellow replacement Shaun Avis could only head Sam Peters' deep cross from the left flank wide of the near post.



Lakenheath FC won the Eastern Counties League Cup on Monday 1st May, for the first time in the clubs history, having only been in Eastern counties League for 6 years and only 2 years in the premier division.

Beating Mulbarton FC, and both local rivals Mildenhall Town FC and Newmarket Town on the way to the final then beating the League champions Ipswich Wanderers in the final, played at Hadleigh United's ground.

#### 18.5.2023

The Bury Free Press reported that a planning application for a six-caravan Traveller site has been refused. A Lakenheath field near Sharper's Corner off Highbridge Gravel Drove will not be opened for Travellers to live on after West Suffolk Council turned down the application last Wednesday.

The council's decision was down to uncertainty over whether it would be Travellers using the site and if the approval would meet a need, alongside risks of flooding and harming the countryside landscape. The decision notice said: "Insufficient information has been provided to demonstrate that all the intended occupants of the proposed pitches would comply with the definition of a Gypsy or Traveller.

Insufficient information has also been given regarding the extent to which the families with nomadic habits of life have previously travelled and how and under what circumstances the families intend on living a nomadic habit of life in the future."

The definition of Traveller referred to is in the Planning Policy for Traveller Sites (2015). The application by John Murkin was for 0.55 hectares of countryside land to be turned into a Gypsy and Traveller site with six static caravan pitches and dayrooms. Agent, Kevin Watts, explained the families bought the site to have a permanent location while their children go to school.

Objections were made to the application by the parish council, Environment Agency and Place Services – which works with the council on landscape issues.

A statement by the parish council said: "The application is for an unsightly, high-fenced enclosure – immediately adjacent to a settlement area and very visible and very audible from many houses."

The council said it thought there was a lack of need, and approval could cause traffic problems.

# **Chairmans Report:**

Lakenheath has Lost 2 shops and Tinas Farm Shop.

On the plus side, thanks to Peta and Jenny who tied themselves in knots with flags and bunting to celebrate Christmas.

The outdoor Gym has been bought and installed by the Parish Council

The new look Lakenheath Times has been a steep learning curve, main driver for the change was to save money.

Big projects in pipeline include the School, planned opening 2025, will be a first on several levels.

Mr Tingley is Head of Governors. On June 8th 2023, there will be a school consultation evening.

The ground around the village sign has been transformed, it will be the first green gateway. Hope for a spectacular show all year round. Judy has put in a lot of effort on this

Over more than a year of begging BT about the scruffy bit of land I can announce that a Lease has been signed. LPC want to remove the dilapidated fence and grassed area, with provision of a mural by school children.

Plans are forming for the High Street Regeneration project: the road layout does not encourage local shoppers. A Master Plan will be drawn up by ACON. Suffolk Highways are to visit to look at the principles and agree in principle. May have to be temporary measures initially, such as planters. In Ipswich, similar temporary measures have now become permanent. Proposed 20 mph speed limit (not the whole village) with Southern Gateway on the other side of Dumpling Bridge Lane. The number (and speed) is scary, 90mph has been recorded in a 30mph limit. The award of the second Freedom of the Parish preceded the sad death of the recipient by a few days.

LPC have sadly lost three Councillors, who chose not to stand in the recent elections, a big thankyou to them for all their work. LPC still have a couple of vacancies and are keen to recruit, have a chat with Nicky if you are interested.

An update from various groups and organisation based in the village follows:

#### Lakenheath Rainbows

Cheryl and Lauren spoke about Lakenheath Rainbows (children 4.5 to 10 years of age, there are 20 members and 9 on the waiting list)

They helped with food donations, litter pick, Summer Fair, Tai Kwon Do and a sponsored walkabout. Provided Mother's Day flowers and a poem.

There are 20 members, Karen and Emma have both got 20 years of service. Looking after the phone box.

# **Christian Enterprise Foundation**

Ernie Neal spoke about the charity; This was started in the early 80's when a local farmer bought the vicarage, which had been a residential home. Mr Neal has been with the Foundation 40 years. The money raised is spent in the village. Interested people should make an application. £130k has been spent, with the school as the biggest beneficiary.

# **Goward and Evans Charity**

There is a lot done by this charity in the village. It has investments and owns land, run by five trustees.

# Lakenheath Heritage group

David told the meeting that the location of the next display panel (there are already two in the village) depends on the High Street Regeneration plans.

Hermione is the village recorder, submits information every year to Ipswich Archives so people can see what goes on. Discoveries have been made about the Lark, and the group are involved in the village plan. Have made an application to list the old school, takes about a month. Meeting with the Library people to perhaps produce an information pamphlet.

#### Lakenheath Silver Band

Daphne said that covid was devastation for the band. Few members are left now. First engagement this year is booked. Please could people put the word out that we need more players- we will teach you. The Siver Band always assist at Remembrance Day.

# Friendship Club

After the pandemic, we realised the need for people to get together – on the first day back, 20 people turned up and there are now 40 on the books. We meet every other Thursday. It costs £2 to get in. We have a Talk play Bingo or have a Quiz. We hold an auction with goods donated by members and we held a Coronation party with a musician. We are picking up one or two people each week.

# Scrabble group

We started with 36 people, then 10, now 17. We moved to the methodist Church. Average attendees 22. Charge is £2 per session

# **Lakenheath Good Neighbours**

Peta Gyte told the meeting that this group was started in 2006. The scheme runs via a mobile phone; it is open from 9 to 5 Monday to Friday. We have completed 500 jobs since last May. The 14 volunteers are all DBS checked. Most tasks involve driving; all trips within the village are free although people do give a donation. We hold lunches and afternoon teas. Mrs Gyte expressed her thanks to all the volunteers, and to CEF and LPC for their support and top up funds. The feedback from users is always positive.

Speeding is one of the villages greatest concerns. Volunteers try to educate and encourage people to slow down. There are 8 volunteers, all trained. They go out once a week to one of 7 designated sites. Vehicles travelling at over 35mph are reported to the Police Community safety officer; persistent offenders get a Police visit. Numbers vary- sometimes only 4/5 caught travelling 30+ mph but can be as high as 40. Given the recorded information, the Police will target certain roads at certain times. Data from the speed indicator devices is linked.

Lakenheath were going to employ a PCSO, but then District Council took over parking. West Suffolk do have a parking enforcement team, round starts Newmarket, then Mildenhall, then Lakenheath, then Brandon. Normally in Lakenheath midmorning when traffic is not usually a problem. The zebra crossing needs repainting it is too dull. One idea was put forward i.e. make Anchor Lane one way.

The Chairman is trying to engage the Co-op in parking measures. Roy asked about traffic calming measures, but the idea had been dismissed previously.

#### **Coronation Celebration**

The village was decorated for His Majesty's Coronation.

Sunday was a Family Lunch, hosted by the Pavilion.

#### **Aircraft Noise**

A resident told the meeting that, when coming in from Mildenhall, the noise is physically unbearable. Very stressful. The Squadron Leader has explained that there are measurement criteria. Asked to keep a diary of the unacceptable noise levels. The Chairman commented that the noise from jets is one of his bug bears. The noise contour maps used in 2020 were drawn up before the F35's arrived, i.e. modelling that was done in 2013.

The parish Council had taken issue with the siting of the school. This is an environmental issue and is on the Chairs list of priorities. EU Directive 2022: requirement on the government at all levels to measure noise levels and take action to mitigate. Evidence is needed, he has asked universities if they would be interested in noise measurement. All the RAF will comment is `we can`t share that`. In USA, (Vermont) 15 houses were regarded as uninhabitable because of noise statistics from F35s nearby. Has asked for a formal meeting with the general. One in six of our residents is a US serviceman. Looking at related figures around increased heart failure risk mental health issues, ear problems.

Noise from military aircraft is not considered, under law, as a `nuisance`.

Section 8 of the Human Rights Act refers to `spoiling enjoyment`. Has provided details on two occasions but no response.



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### Lakenheath Youth FC

Lakenheath Youth FC was formed over 40 years ago to provide football for children in the village. Over those

### 17.8.2023

From RSPB Lakenheath. Where have all the birds gone?

It is late summer and all the birds have disappeared!

The apparent disappearance of birds in August is another natural change and a part of the annual cycle of birds. There are two reasons for this.

Firstly, once birds have completed their breeding for the year, they start to moult into fresh new feathers. Completing a moult of all feathers takes several weeks. During this period birds look rather scruffy, and while they are moulting their wing feathers, they are less able to escape predators.

During this time, they conceal themselves as much as possible to avoid predators and territory disputes. It's easy to get the impression that they've disappeared.

Secondly, in late summer a bounty of natural food becomes available as grain, berries and fruit ripen. Many birds abandon their nesting areas and move to where the most food is. This is probably the time of the year when birds are least interested in the offerings on our bird tables.

In areas where farmland is nearby, house sparrows, starlings and many finches move out to fields to feast on the abundance of grain before it is harvested, and on the spilt grain after the harvest. Depending on the location, this can cause a sudden disappearance of these birds from residential areas and gardens.

Even in cities, sparrows and finches are attracted to any piece of rough ground that provides a good crop of weed seeds. Tits tend to abandon their territories soon after their young fledge, and spend most of their time in the late summer (first in family

groups, later in larger flocks) high up in tree canopies, where they are easily missed. Even blackbirds and song thrushes tend to move to where there is an abundance of fruit or berries.

Birds often only return to our gardens when autumn frosts appear.

### 16.8.2023

It was today that Ben Cowling has revealed that he has been relieved of his duties as joint manager of Lakenheath Football Club. The village club enjoyed an impressive rise following Cowling's appointment in the spring of 2018, one which has seen them earn two promotions from the Cambridgeshire County Leagues and Thurlow Nunn League First Division up to Step 5.

Under former Haverhill Rovers boss Cowling, Lakenheath also lifted the Suffolk Senior Cup and League Challenge Cup, as well as finishing fifth last season – the club's highest ever position in the non-league pyramid.

Those last two triumphs were also overseen by Trevor Collins, who came in midway through last term to work alongside Cowling and the pair were subsequently appointed joint bosses.

But it now appears that Collins – along with first-team coach Ian Miller – will take control of Lakenheath ahead of Saturday's Emirates FA Cup preliminary round tie at neighbouring Mildenhall Town.

Cowling wrote on Twitter: "So, didn't think this would happen but I have just been relieved of my duties @Lakenheath FC. Immensely proud of taking the club from Step 7 to 5, winning the Suffolk Senior Cup and League Cup on the way as well as playing a massive role in the redevelopment of the ground."

Lakenheath sit top of the early Premier Division standings on goal difference with maximum points from their opening three fixtures.

### 30.8.2023

The USAF advised the community The US air force has secured \$50m (£39m) funding next year for a project that could pave the way for American nuclear weapons to return to British soil for the first time in more than 15 years. In justifying the expenditure on a 144-bed dormitory at RAF Lakenheath in Suffolk, the USAF told Congress the building was intended to "house the increase in enlisted personnel as the result of the potential surety mission", which is jargon typically used by the Pentagon to refer to handling of nuclear weapons, according to experts.

Construction of the dormitory is due to begin in June 2024 and last until February 2026, and is the latest in a series of signs that preparations are under way for the possible return of US nuclear weapons to UK territory.

Matt Korda, of the Federation of American Scientists (FAS), who first reported on the budget request, said: "The mention of the arrival of the potential surety mission

caught my eye as that is a buzzword, a term commonly used in the defence department and the nuclear weapons complex to refer to the positive control of nuclear weapons in a safe and secure way."

The FAS previously reported that in the 2023 defence budget, the UK was added to the list of countries where infrastructure investment is under way on "special weapons" storage sites in Europe, alongside Belgium, Germany, Italy, the Netherlands, and Turkey.

The FAS estimates there are about 100 B61 gravity bombs in storage in those five countries. They were withdrawn from the UK in 2007, but the storage facilities for the bombs were mothballed rather than dismantled.

US nuclear weapons were first based in the UK in 1954, notably at RAF Greenham Common and RAF Molesworth, but also at RAF Lakenheath, which at one time had shelters to store as many 110 air launched B61 nuclear bombs.

Britain's nuclear force is made up exclusively of submarine-launched Trident missiles, but the US maintains a "nuclear triad" of bombs that can be launched from the sea, air and land. While the US cruise missiles were withdrawn in 1991, the gravity bombs were maintained at Lakenheath for at least another 16 years before their removal.

The Pentagon did not respond to a request for comment. A spokesperson for the UK Ministry of Defence said: "It remains a long-standing UK and NATO policy to neither confirm nor deny the presence of nuclear weapons at a given location."

If such weapons were based in the UK, it is likely they would remain under US military control.

The campaign group CND called on the prime minister to refuse to allow the US to house nuclear weapons on British soil, once the upgrades to Lakenheath were completed.

Kate Hudson, the organisation's general secretary, said: "It's becoming increasingly clear that Lakenheath is once again a vital cog in Washington's overseas nuclear machine – despite refusals from the British government to acknowledge this reality." She said their presence would make the UK a more likely target in any nuclear war.

Concerns about nuclear conflict have been at their highest level for some years since Russia's invasion of Ukraine.

In 2021, the UK announced it would lift its own stockpile of Trident nuclear warheads by 40% to 260, the first such increase since the end of the cold war and a reflection of increasing western anxiety over Russian intentions and growing Chinese capability.

The B61 bombs were once considered obsolete by the US military, a relic of the cold war. But instead of being retired, they have been upgraded to extend their life and improve their accuracy.

The new version, the B61-12, is expected to arrive in Europe this year. The new F-35A Lightning II fighters have been given certification to be armed with the modernised bombs, and the 495th Fighter Squadron, stationed at RAF Lakenheath, is due to become the first unit in Europe to receive the nuclear-capable planes.

Last November, the C-17A Globemaster III military transport plane was approved to carry the B61-12 bombs, allowing it to distribute them to storage sites at bases in the US and Europe.

"All of these things provide pretty significant evidence that it's very possible that the nuclear mission could return to the UK," Korda said.

In an interview in December 2021, two months before Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine, NATO's secretary general, Jens Stoltenberg, said: "We have no plans of stationing any nuclear weapons in any other countries than we already have these nuclear weapons as part of our deterrence." That statement does not necessarily exclude the UK, which previously hosted B61 bombs.

It is not clear from the budget documents whether the UK is intended to become a permanent base for US nuclear weapons, or a contingency base in the event of a crisis.

Another possibility is that when old versions of the B61 are withdrawn from Incirlik airbase in Turkey, they will not be replaced by B61-12s, because of longstanding concerns over the base's proximity to the Syrian border and internal Turkish security after the attempted coup of 2016. In that case, the new bombs could be stationed in Lakenheath instead.

### LAKENHEATH HERITAGE GROUP THE BELLS OF SAINT MARY'S



he Church of St Mary the Virgin holds much of Lakenheath's heritage and not least two of her ring of six bells, the third and fourth bells were both cast at John Danyells foundry in London circa 1460 and the third bell weigh's in at 6 hundredweight and 3 pounds, rings in the note of B flat not entirely in harmony with her five sisters but entirely in harmony with her five sisters but hardly noticeable to the untrained ear she is inscribed in Latin Sanctus Kalerrina ora Pro Nobis (May Christ give us the joys of eternal life), third and fourth are both inscribed with the Royal coat of arms.

The fourth bell over two hundredweight heavier at 8 Cwt 2qrs & 9Lbs is inscribe Ariftus Perpetue Det Nobis Gaudia Vite.

Money was bequeathed for these two bells by Money was bequeathed for these two bells by a local Farmer John Horold in 1454 the story goes that he also paid for the ladder that leads up the tower it is believed to be that original ladder still in use today, the date of 1624 is carved in its side with the initials RD, the dates do not coincide, who was RD a mystery?

It is quite amazing considering the life of so much that is manufactured in our throw away world, to think that these bells were cast in the reign of King Edward the 4th some 560 years past, over all of these years they have called people to Church given warnings celebrated peace jubilees Coronations and still ring regularly today.

The heavy going plain bearings on the back five were replaced with ball bearings around twenty years ago by a local business man and the tower captain at no cost, ringing became so much easier.

so much easier.

The fifth bell at 10 Cwt 3qrs & 19 Lbs cast in 1697 and inscribed, John Parsley Vicar, & Charles Newman made me, the Vicar made a monetary donation towards the casting of this (then the fourth bell) the Churchwarden at that time was Thomas Kitchener of the Earl Kitchener family. Kitchener family.

The tenor bell the heaviest at 13Cwt 3qrs & 21Lbs inscribed Thomas Denton and James Parlet Churchwardens, this bell now requires some professional attention, for many many years the ringers have cared for the bells without cost.

without cost. Until 1915 St Mary's had a ring of five bells the then treble bell (now the second) 5CWt & 3Lbs was recast by Alfred Bowell of Ipswich and hung in the new metal frame engineered by the same company at a cost of £137-00, in 1946 the new treble bell at 4CWt & 3qrs was hung in the space provided in the metal frame in celebration of the ending of the second world war at a cost of £126-12-6.

Mr Robert Dent came to Lakenheath in 1936 and served as the local school's headmaster for many years, he was a proficient ringer of Church bells a lay reader and he brought the skill of method ringing to Lakenheath teaching the local band of ringers the art, on Wednesday evening October 27th 1948 the first quarter peal of 1260 changes recorded on Lakenheath bells was rung by:

### UPDATED NEWS FOR LAKENHEATH WALKERS!

Last time I reported optimistically that the problems with overgrown footpaths in Lakenheath, had been solved. I was relying on the assurances of the County Council, which in turn were relying on the



assurances of the contractor. Although the contractor did cut at the beginning of 2023 some of the paths he had failed to cut in 2022, others were just left. Remedial work was also supposed to be carried out, but it was not done.

The path (Footpath 3) between Claypits Bridge on the Undley Road and the path from the Community Centre is dangerous as the bushes have been allowed to grow up on top of the lode bank so you have to walk on the sloping side of the bank. Also at one point the load bank has been dug out leaving a steep slope on loose soil near the lode. The Parish walk no longer uses this path which restricts the walks we can do.

Other paths are also overgrown and should have been cut in May and should now be cut again, starting in August. I had a meeting with the County Rights of Way Officer on 19 May when we discussed the state of the paths and inspected some of them. I think the Officer now has a better understanding of how serious the situation is.

### Eleven-day period of limited night flying at RAF Lakenheath

RAF LAKENHEATH, England — The 48th Fighter Wing will conduct limited night flying beginning Sept. 5-7, then Sept. 11-14 and again Sept. 18-21.

During this period, communities in East Anglia and the surrounding regions may see and hear U.S. aircraft taking off, landing, and transiting between RAF Lakenheath and training ranges over the North Sea several times between 7:00 p.m. and 10:30 p.m. Overland flying will be limited as much as possible between sunset and sunrise.

Exercises like this provide both aircrew and support personnel stationed at RAF Lakenheath the experience needed to maintain a ready force capable of ensuring the collective defence of the NATO alliance.

"We must train like we fight in order to maintain operational readiness, and night flying is a critical muscle we must continue to flex," said Brigadier General Joseph L. Campo, 48th Fighter Wing commander. "We understand the disturbance this may cause to our local communities, and appreciate the patience and understanding as we ensure our Airmen remain trained and ready to secure the sovereign skies anytime, day or night."

The exercise does not include plans for low-altitude flying in East Anglia or the surrounding regions. All training will be conducted in accordance with Ministry of Defence and U.K. airspace regulations.

Two organisations took to Suffolk streets yesterday to protest the possible return of nuclear weapons to a US air base.

Six members from the Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament (CND) attempted a citizens' weapons inspection at RAF Lakenheath and Bury St Edmunds Quakers held a silent witness. This follows speculation that the base could host the first US nuclear weapons in 15 years.

The purpose of the day of action was for the CND members to conduct a search of the base to see whether nuclear weapons are being housed there.

It comes after the US Air Force's budgetary justification report which said plans have been lodged to build a new 144-bedroom 'surety dormitory' at RAF Lakenheath, which forms part of a \$50m (£39m) project.

If permitted, it would be the first time B61 bombs will be stored in the UK since 2008, according to the Federation of American Scientists (FAS). They had been present at the air base since at least 1954.

Communications officer Pádraig McCarrick said: "Nationwide we had a Lakenheath day of action so our local CND groups were in their communities having stalls, events and protest rallies to raise awareness

### 28.9.2023

Plans have been submitted for a 'crucial' 420-place primary school in Lakenheath to replace an existing school site which is due to reach full capacity soon.

The proposals were submitted by Suffolk County Council for the school, which has additional space for 30 pre-school children, to be built on land north of Station Road in the village.

The existing 315-place Lakenheath Community Primary School in Mill Road will soon reach maximum capacity due to housing growth in the area.

The proposals would replace and expand the existing primary school facilities in the village.

There are plans for 663 homes to be built in the catchment area of the school which could result in 164 primary-age pupils. Without expanding the current provision there would be insufficient places in this area.

The plans emphasise the 'crucial need for the proposed new pre-school and primary school' for the village.

The design statement, by agent Concertus, said the 3.2 hectare proposed school site has the potential to accommodate up to 630 pupils and 60 pre-school places.

It would also feature two under 12s football pitches and a hard netball court, along with an outdoor classroom. There would also be a further outdoor learning area and Reptile Mitigation Area.

Additionally, the main school entrance would have 10 pupil drop-off spaces. In the north-west corner of the site would be the main staff and visitor car park which would have 59 parking spaces – six would be electric vehicle charging bays, a further three would be accessible spaces.

The building will be built in an 'L' shape to maximise natural light and minimise directly south-facing classrooms.

It will be painted in a palette of muted green tones to relate to the colours of the surrounding natural landscape and rural woodland setting, emphasising the building's green credentials.

The proposed new school aims to deliver an environment which allows for more children to attend school in the area.

A free bonfire and fireworks display organised by a Suffolk farm which has previously pulled in the crowds with a popular pumpkin patch has announced it has had to cancel the event.

An email from Undley Farm, near Lakenheath, sent out to people who had snapped up the highly popular tickets said the reasons for not doing the November 3 event included concerns over the forecasted weather on the day and that the car park is flooded due to recent bad weather.

This news comes after the site had to cancel its popular pumpkin patch and Maize Maze in September for a second year in a row. The highly popular event was set to take place on November 3.

### 2.11.2023

### 5.11.2023

We learn today that a massive project for 139 new homes in Lakenheath has taken a step forward. On Wednesday morning (November 1), West Suffolk councillors debated a reserved matters application by the developer, Persimmon Homes Suffolk, following initial approval in 2018. This relates to land west of Eriswell Road as you enter the village from the south.

The development will see the new houses being built in a 5.43-hectare site to the south of the village. A reserved matters application gives councillors a chance to consider items initially excluded from the planning application, including access, appearance, landscaping, layout, and scale. Among the house total, 42 are

classified as 'affordable dwellings' to be spread out across the site to promote integration. The developer has also agreed to invest just over £85,000 in infrastructure outside the scope of the site, including improvements to rights of way, junctions, libraries, and schools.

Throughout the length of the development, including during the initial decision, various concerns were raised regarding impacts to the village such as connectivity issues, noise, flooding, and the urbanisation of the countryside. Today, these issues were once again raised, including a particular worry expressed by Cllr Phil Wittam, who said the loss of trees because of the need to minimise the risk of bird strikes to passing aircraft, was a 'crying shame'.

Cllr Carol Bull added it was akin to 'taking away with one hand and giving with the other'. However, the tree-planting schedule provided by the developer was deemed 'suitable' in relation to the project's landscaping needs.

The application was approved.

### 9.11.23

A charity Zumbathon helped to raise over £1,500 and saw about 50 people turn up to the event in a Lakenheath. Zumba instructor Kirsty Creasy decided to raise money for the East Anglian Air Ambulance service after recently finding out it was a charity that purely relies on donations from the public.

As a result, she wanted to help support the charity and held the fitness event at the Lakenheath Peace Memorial Hall, managing to raise £1,601 overall. Kirsty said: "The turnout was incredible considering how awful the weather was and the flooded roads, yet we managed to raise a whopping £1,601.

I love how Zumba creates a party-like atmosphere bringing everyone together, getting to experience different songs, routines, instructors and meeting new likeminded people. "I felt it was a good cause to raise money for whilst doing something you can enjoy so much - Zumba."

Due to the success of the Zumbathon in the village, Kirsty is already planning to do another next year in either February or March.


She said: "I am so proud of myself for organising such an amazing event.

This EXERCISE is a routine training exercise designed to enhance the 48th Fighter Wing readiness and safeguard civilians, base personnel and their families.

### 16.11.2023

The East Anglian daily times reported that a legal campaign has been launched over fears an RAF base could be set to host nuclear weapons. The Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament (CND) is legally challenging development works at RAF Lakenheath which it believes are being prepared to station nuclear weapons.

The group believes that a planned 144-bed dormitory could lead to the return of nuclear weapons at the Suffolk airbase and is calling on West Suffolk Council to intervene.

Work on the expansion is expected to start next year and will create more room for US personnel.

Earlier this year a team from CND gathered outside RAF Lakenheath, which is between the village and Mildenhall, with the aim of searching the base for nuclear weapons.

They believe the United States Air Force is using the base, which is the largest USoperated base in England, to deploy nuclear weapons for the first time in 15 years.

The first US nuclear bombs arrived on British soil in September 1954, and several sources confirmed the withdrawal of the weapons in 2008.

CND is calling on the Ministry of Defence to halt any developments at the base until necessary screening is carried out.

The MoD has a policy of not confirming the presence of nuclear weapons at a given location.

Kate Hudson of CND said: "USAF has ploughed ahead with construction at the airbase by purportedly relying on planning rights that assume that the development won't have significant environmental effects. But in doing that they have completely ignored the risks that stationing nuclear weapons would entail and therefore might arguably be operating unlawfully in breach of planning control."

A spokesman for West Suffolk Council said: "We have received a letter from CND and are considering our response."

The Bury Free Press reported Campaigners are legally challenging development works at RAF Lakenheath that it believes are preparations for the return of US nuclear weapons to British soil.

The Campaign for Nuclear Disarmament (CND) says the controversial plans should be subject to proper public scrutiny, through the planning process, and is calling for the Ministry of Defence (MoD) to halt the works at the base, home to the US Air Force's (USAF's) 48th Fighter Wing.

There is speculation that the base could host the first US nuclear weapons in 15 years after a US Air Force's budgetary justification report said plans had been lodged to build a new 144-bedroom 'surety dormitory' at RAF Lakenheath, which forms part of a \$50m (£39m) project.

'Surety' is said to be a term commonly used within the Department of Defense and Department of Energy to refer to the capability to keep nuclear weapons safe, secure, and under positive control.

The CND has sent letters to the MoD and West Suffolk Council, which is the local planning authority, claiming the development does not have permitted development rights, and has called on the MoD to halt works while the necessary environmental screening is carried out.

The campaign group says the work could go ahead without an environmental impact assessment if it was being carried out by or on behalf of the Crown but believes this does not apply since the building works are being done by and for the USAF.

In a statement to Suffolk News, the MoD said: "The planned accommodation block falls under existing permitted development rights and work is underway to support an Environmental Impact Assessment screening."

A spokesman for West Suffolk Council said they had received a letter from CND and were considering their response.

The CND claims there has been no screening of the dormitory plan by West Suffolk Council to show it would have no significant environmental impact and without that screening it cannot have permitted development rights.

In its legal letter to the MoD, the CND says the development works for the dormitory should not be considered as one of several small projects but as part of one whole project with a major environmental impact that should be assessed.

It says any assessment must include not only the construction of the buildings comprising the various developments, but also the effects of the use of those buildings - that is the effects of stationing nuclear weapons at RAF Lakenheath.

Kate Hudson, of CND, said: "USAF has ploughed ahead with construction at the airbase by purportedly relying on planning rights that assume that the development won't have significant environmental effects. But in doing that they've completely ignored the risks that stationing nuclear weapons would entail and therefore might arguably be operating unlawfully in breach of planning CND is represented by planning law specialist, solicitor Ricardo Gama at law firm Leigh Day.

Ricardo Gama said: "CND wants to make sure that the development at RAF Lakenheath, and the wider question of whether nuclear weapons should be stationed on UK soil, if that is what the USAF is planning, does not slip under the radar without proper public scrutiny.

"The planning process is one way for members of the public to make representations on these controversial plans."

Work on the dormitory is due to start next year and is reportedly to house the extra US personnel needed as part of the 'potential surety mission'.

The USAF was approached for comment, but deferred to the MoD.

# 6.12.2023

The Bury Free Press reports that Plans for a new primary school in Lakenheath have been given the green light.

In September, Suffolk County Council applied to West Suffolk Council for a 420place primary school on land north of Station Road, Lakenheath to replace an existing school site, which is due to reach capacity soon.

In a letter to the county council, Rachel Almond, West Suffolk Council service manager (planning – development), said the authority had no objections to the proposals subject to some issues – including pedestrian safety, aircraft noise mitigation and insufficient drop-off space to accommodate peak school runs – being addressed.

The existing 315-place Lakenheath Community Primary School, in Mill Road, will soon reach maximum capacity due to housing growth in the area.

There are plans for 663 homes to be built in the catchment area of the school, which could result in an additional 164 primary-age pupils.

Without expanding the current provision there would be insufficient places in the area.

A design statement, by agent for Suffolk County Council, Concertus, said the 3.2 hectare proposed school site had the potential to accommodate up to 630 pupils and 60 pre-school places.

It would also feature two under 12s football pitches and a hard netball court, an outdoor classroom, a further outdoor learning area and reptile mitigation area.

The scheme allows for the main school entrance to have 10 pupil drop-off spaces, while the main staff and visitor car park would have 59 parking spaces.

### 7.12.2023

The East Anglian Daily Times reports that Suffolk pub The Plough in Lakenheath is set to reopen its doors following closure of Chinese restaurant Wok n Rock. The pub is set to reopen its doors under new management as a pub and restaurant.

It had previously been a Chinese restaurant, Wok n Rock, before the eatery closed in September. A spokesperson for the flint faced 19th century pub on social media said: "We are delighted to say The Plough is under new management and will be reopening in the near future."

The statement added that the pub was searching for bar staff, kitchen staff, servers and an experienced chef. Additionally, the pub will be looking to do breakfast, lunch and evening menus as well as offer accommodation.

## 26.12.2024

Lakenheath became the first team to win at Mildenhall Town in the Thurlow Nunn League Premier Division this season during today's Boxing Day derby.

Ahead of kick off, table-topping Mildenhall had won nine and drawn the other one of their 10 outings at The Riverside Stadium so far this term.

But while the home side controlled large parts of the encounter – despite being reduced to 10 men midway through the first half – visiting Lakenheath ran out 1-0 winners' courtesy of Jamie R Smith's neat finish before the interval.



Mildenhall's biggest threat during the first half came from corners, with Alfie Connor's left-flank deliveries causing problems. In the 17th minute Adam Capel's downward header was scooped away by Ross Bilham in the visitors' goal and four minutes later Jarid Robson's glancing effort cannoned against the woodwork.

However, Mildenhall's early momentum was halted by the 22nd-minute dismissal of Capel, who clipped Jamie R Smith as he looked to skip past the centre-back. Mildenhall's argument was that the ball had run straight through to their goalkeeper Josh Pope, but referee Sam Jones had little hesitation in brandishing the red card.

It took Lakenheath seven minutes to make their numerical advantage count courtesy of a swift counter-attack involving Luke Young. His pass set Jamie R Smith clear and with Pope advancing off his line to narrow the angle, the young forward calmly slotted in his eighth goal of the campaign

Lakenheath's number nine also had the ball in the net just before the half-time whistle when he turned the ball in from close range, only for his celebrations to be cut short by an offside flag.

It was a depleted Mildenhall that controlled large parts of the encounter after the restart, with recent addition Jake Chambers-Shaw coming off the bench to dictate proceedings. It was his cross in the 67th minute that Robson looked to sweep in before Luke Bailey made a last-ditch block to thwart the danger.

Sixty seconds later Ben Nolan and Tanner Call linked smartly on the edge of the box to carve out an opening for Mildenhall forward Olly Hughes, but the former Bury Town man dragged his shot wide of the left upright.

As Mildenhall committed more and more players forward in search of an equaliser, gaps started to appear at the other end. Jamie A Smith saw his curling effort kept out by Pope while Ross Bailey lashed his effort well over the top.

December rainfall was 89 mm.

# RSPB Lakenheath Fen's journey through 2023

It feels only right to begin this entry by remarking that 2023 was a better year for us than the year before- we began 2022 with a fire in our workshop and a second burglary, but we are delighted to be able to say that we sailed through 2023 without any further incidents of that nature. Also, crucially, all our volunteers and staff made it through the year safe and sound and we have begun to watch Spring unfolding in 2024 with much excitement and anticipation about what the new year will bring for the wildlife here and the reserve itself.

The first notable event of 2023 and one that is quite significant in our history was the acquisition of an additional 54 hectares of land on Cowles Drove, to the north of the Little Ouse. On World Wetlands Day (2 February annually) a public announcement was made via our social media channels and local news outlets. The land purchase was made possible through two other organisations- firstly the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation- a charity who enable other charities (such as the RSPB) to take

advantage of land purchases on the spur of the moment- i.e. when the land comes up for sale. The Esmée Fairbairn Foundation lent us the full asking price for the land, under the promise that we will pay back the money, interest-free, once we have funded the purchase through other means. This came in the form of a donation from the Morgan Sindall construction Group (MSG), through a scheme known as Biodiversity Net Gain. This is where construction companies are now obliged to offset any losses their activities cause to the environment and it's wildlife by investing enough in local conservation projects to be proportionate with the losses incurred.

As a result, MSG paid the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation the money they had spent on the new land, and also contributed a substantial sum towards the costs of transforming the land into our new vision for it. One large square field north of the drove-way and some smaller fields south of it, connecting up fields we already owned, meant greater flexibility in terms of what we could do with the land. Our ambition for our landholding along Cowles Drove has always been to raise the water levels in order to provide suitable nesting habitat for wading birds such as Common snipe, Redshank, Lapwing and year-round foraging habitat for these wader species as well as waterfowl and Common cranes. However, the extent to which we could raise the water levels was limited prior to February 2023 because we didn't want to affect the productivity of our neighbours' agricultural land. With better connected fields now forming one solid block (see photo), we could set to work. Throughout the autumn and winter of 2023 (and into 2024) we began to dig new ditches, add in dams and sluices to manipulate the water table and to help the land hold much more water than before.

As well as supporting wildlife, we also intend to help reduce carbon emissions from the land, especially in areas where the soil has a high peat content. When peaty soil, or grassland, is wet, it acts as a carbon 'sink' absorbing carbon dioxide from the atmosphere through mosses and plants growing upon it. However, when the soil is bare, and dry, this locked-away carbon is lost- it literally turns to dust and blows away in the wind. In 2024 we will hopefully be able to begin to see changes in the habitats and wildlife on Cowles Drove, and we hope to report on this in 2024.

In conjunction with the new land purchase, our fleet of vehicles changed from one Toyota Hilux and one Renault Megane to two Toyota Hilux instead- this reflected our increasing need for off-road vehicles now that the reserve has drastically increased in size. Having two trucks is also helpful in managing our other reserve- a portion of Cavenham Quarry near Tuddenham village.

Then, along came Spring- and surveys of our nesting Marsh harriers and Bitterns began on 14 March. Each Tuesday morning, our dedicated volunteers joined us as we spread out across the reserve with walkie-talkies and clipboards to record the number and location of Bittern 'booms' and Marsh harriers dropping into, or leaving, specific location in the reedbeds. Around 8-10 of us take part in these surveys and by each recording what we see and hear, we hope to reliably plot the possible nests of Bitterns and Marsh harriers by having many pairs of eyes around at once. Results from the surveys in 2023 indicated 11 Bittern nests (with eight booming males) and 6 Harrier nests. In May and June we moved to recording feeding flights to and from the

nests (which the first surveys help us to pinpoint). For these later surveys, we run public events whereby on three dates, we take one or two booked guests with us for the surveys, who get to use high seats and sit alongside one of our wardens or our Site Manager during the event. Happily, all three events had both spaces taken which helped support our events income for the year. We counted at least 11 fledgling Marsh harriers from at least five successful nests- but they were likely more.

Whilst these co-ordinated surveys were happening, behind the scenes our Common cranes were going about their breeding habits as quietly as they could- they are very discreet when it comes to nesting time. Eggs are laid in mid-March, and are incubated by the parents for an average of 28 days, before hatching and needing 9-10 weeks of supervision by the parents until they are able to fly. At no point during these 13-14 weeks are the eggs or chicks left unattended by at least one parent, under normal circumstances. Each parent takes turns to be 'on duty' whilst the other stretches its wings and goes off to feed and rest. As Spring progressed, we feared the worst as we heard and saw very little from either of our breeding pairs in places we might normally catch a glimpse of them. We had thought that due to predation both pairs had lost both of their eggs, or chicks, at some point and the mood on the reserve was quite despondent.

Nature has its ups and downs and whilst the birds 'just get on with it' us humans struggled with the news. We were especially concerned for Pair B2, who hadn't been spotted by anyone for weeks- we didn't even think they were still on the reserve. However, as close as we could be to a miracle- on 4 June one of our trail cameras picked up an image of a near fully-grown chick waltzing up and down the track with its vigilant parents in tow. We were shocked, but utterly delighted (included is the image which sent our hearts racing). We can now happily say this youngster fledged-and spent the following Summer, Autumn and Winter parading around the local area with its' parents! Whilst we might always hope for more Common crane fledglings from the reserve, last year certainly taught us to be grateful for even one- and we were!

As Spring turned into Summer, we began to see a wider variety of butterflies and dragonflies out on the reserve. In 2023 we recorded 22 different butterflies and 22 different dragonflies. Our more unusual species made a good appearance- including Small red-eyed damselfly and Variable damselfly. Our numbers of Norfolk hawker continued to increase, as they have done year-on-year since it first appeared here around four years ago. The species has been expanding its range from the Norfolk and Suffolk Broads, which are its stronghold, and we hope that in years to come we continue to see more of it. Three of our volunteers commenced their weekly butterfly surveys around our Brandon Fen route in March and carried out over 30 surveys. We are very grateful to them for helping us build a picture of which butterflies use the reserve, roughly how many there are and when they are flying. The charity Butterfly Conservation, who co-ordinate the surveys, will also be very grateful to receive the survey results too, which we send in each Autumn for compilation into national statistics. This data then feeds into government decision making so it is crucial stuff!

At Lakenheath Fen we typically see around 80% of our annual visitors between the months of March and May and 2023 was no exception. Our busiest month was June with 6,621 visitors (a very high monthly figure for us). We recorded slightly lower total visitors in 2023 than average but a relatively chilly, wet Spring definitely impacted our appeal to visitors- warm, sunny, calm days attract most visitors, and we can be very busy during our peak season when the weather is right. Booming bitterns, Hobbies, Kingfishers and of course the Common cranes are often the reason for a visitors' trip, and with a bit of luck all of these can be seen or heard fairly easily in Spring, which is why we are so popular then. We welcomed 18 group visits, mainly from regional birdwatching and U3A groups, with an occasional school or Scouts group too. Whilst we don't have the resources (very regrettably) to support regular educational visits, we do try to accommodate groups that make enquiries with us, such as to borrow equipment like pond-dipping kits for self-led visits.

Our events were well attended, partly thanks to our fairly new booking website-NuTickets- once we'd got to grips with adding, editing and advertising listings, we found it straightforward to use and easy to use in publicity, too. We held over 20 events, the largest of which was our annual Race for Wildlife, which was back on after a hiatus of three years due to COVID. In 2022, we came very close to holding it as large gatherings were permitted once again, albeit quite close to the event date in October. In the end, the difficult decision was made to postpone it another year, into 2023, to allow attendee numbers to build up enough to make it financially viable. It was heartwarming that around 21 of the 42 people booked onto the 2022 event were happy to carry their tickets over to 2023, giving us a good head start with our bookings. We ended up with 91 attendees in 2023 and the day went smoothly with many happy, but tired, faces at the finish line. Two runners decided to sponsor themselves and as a result, raised over £600 in additional funds for us, for which we are very grateful.

Our second-largest event was the Big Wild Sleepout, which was a resounding success. We sold out with 40 tickets, and guests enjoyed a night's camping on the reserve as well as a range of activities including guided walks, pond-dipping, bughunting as well as making bug hotels and mini ponds to take home. We are definitely very pleased to be able to return to our pre-COVID level of events and activity and all involved enjoyed a busy year full of contented visitors. Let's hope 2024 brings the same! The weather was much improved throughout 2023 compared to the year before. Although water levels stayed fairly low- a lingering effect of six months without rain in 2022- we received regular Spring and Summer rain which helped the wildlife to recover. We hope that in 2024 we see another fairly normal pattern of weather to support the wildlife on the reserve through the warm months. No-one can tell what the next year will bring for the reserve, it's wildlife or the human team of volunteers and staff, but we hope for another good one like 2023.
